

Suggested Courses to Meet High School Core Admission Requirements for the University of Nebraska-Lincoln

Applicants graduating from high school in January 1997 or later must meet the following core course requirements:

English: 4 high school units; all units must include intensive reading and writing experience.

Foreign Language: 2 high school units. Two years of the same foreign language.

Math: 4 high school units; must include algebra, algebra II, geometry and one additional unit that builds on a knowledge of algebra II (e.g., pre-calculus, calculus, college algebra)

Natural Sciences: 3 high school units; at least two of the three units selected from biology, chemistry, physics, and earth sciences. The third unit may be from another science. One of the units must include laboratory instruction.

Social Sciences: 3 high school units; at least one unit of American and/or world history and one additional unit of history, American government, and/or geography, and a third unit drawn from any social science discipline.

Applicants who graduated from high school prior to 1997 should talk with the UNL Admissions Office (472-2023) regarding their specific admission requirements.

Transfer students who did not complete core course requirements while in high school may complete equivalent work by subject area at Southeast Community College. An appropriate SCC course will substitute for one unit (one year) of high school-level work.

The following courses offered at Southeast Community College meet the spirit of academic preparation desired. This is a partial list of suggested courses. Options to substitute other courses may be confirmed with the UNL Office of Admissions 402-472-2023. Your UNL college advisor will determine whether courses used to meet admission requirements can also apply toward your UNL degree requirements. The Architecture, Business and Human Resources and Family Sciences College do not accept high school deficiency credits as degree courses.

Note: Applicants must also meet performance requirements. Transfer students must have at least a 2.0 cumulative grade-point average for all institutions attended and 2.0 GPA for their latest term.
