

DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS & COMMUNITIES ACT

Southeast Community College believes that comprehensive environmental approaches are the most effective way to reduce alcohol use and alcohol-related problems.

This brochure provides students, their families, and employees with resources for early intervention and the potential consequences related to substance use and abuse.

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INFORMATION ON SUBSTANCE ABUSE & AMNESTY

Employees and students are encouraged to seek help with substance/use problems or concerns. Amnesty may be available for students who bring their own use, addiction, or dependency to the attention of College officials – independent of the threat of drug tests or conduct sanctions – and who will agree to seek assistance.

FEDERAL & NEBRASKA LAW

Students and employees are reminded that unlawful possession, distribution, or use of illicit drugs or alcohol may subject individuals to criminal prosecution. The College will refer violations of proscribed conduct to appropriate authorities for possible prosecution.

Federal regulations and state laws provide penalties of fines and imprisonment for violations of the criminal statutes which include possessing, offering for sale, possessing with the intent to offer for sale, distributing or manufacturing controlled substances such as opiates, narcotics, depressants, stimulants, or hallucinogenic drugs.

Nebraska law prohibits the possession and use of controlled substances, illegal drugs, and alcoholic beverages on public property. Any changes to state law regarding the possession or use of marijuana or other controlled substances does not negate applicable federal statutes or applicable College policy.

SCC'S DRUG & ALCOHOL POLICY & TESTING

SCC policy E-9(1-2) outlines the College's commitment to controlling and monitoring the use or abuse of drugs, alcohol and other chemicals and controlled substances on college premises and at College-sanctioned events. The College strives to educate students and employees about the use, abuse, and effects of drugs, alcohol and illegal/controlled substances.

The College monitors and pursues compliance with applicable laws relating to drugs, alcohol, and other chemicals and controlled substances including:

- · The Drug-Free Workplace Act
- The Omnibus Transportation Employee Testing Act of 1991
- · The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989
- · All related regulations and rules.

STUDENT-ATHLETES

All student-athletes must consent to random drug testing for drugs/alcohol before participating in any athletic competition or event. Student athletes also must complete and sign the consent form prior to the first athletic event of the Fall semester. Random drug testing may occur at any time throughout the course of the academic year, or during the period in which athletic events are occurring.

EXCEPTION

The use and possession of alcoholic beverages may be permitted on college premises or at College-sanctioned activities as follows:

- In limited circumstances approved by the President or designee, and/or
- At activities and events covered by the Class C liquor license currently held by Southeast Community College's Great Plains Culinary Institute.

NOTE: SCC guests and visitors suspected of being under the influence of a controlled substance will be asked to leave College property or any officially recognized activity.

Failure to comply will result in law enforcement intervention.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE TESTING

Southeast Community College will require drug and alcohol tests for employees and students in circumstances where reasonable suspicion exists of drug and/or alcohol use while on College property or at an SCC sanctioned event.

EMPLOYEES

The College's Human Resources Office has administrative responsibility for implementing and monitoring the drug and alcohol testing procedures for employees. Inquiries related to these procedures should be directed to the Vice President for Human Resources, 301 S. 68th St. Place, Lincoln NE 68510; 402-323-3408.

NOTE: On an annual basis, SCC employees and students subject to the College's Criminal Background Check requirements are expected to self-disclose any drug/alcohol related convictions that arise during the course of their active status with the College.

Employees experiencing any level of impairment from illicit drugs, alcohol, or inhalants, and the presence of any odor of illicit drugs (such as marijuana) or alcohol in the work place or on duty time shall be a violation of the drug-free workplace and may constitute a referral for drug and alcohol testing. Additionally, employee drug and alcohol testing may be conducted as a result of a work-related injury or accident.

STUDENTS

Health Programs - All students admitted to the health sciences program requiring a clinical rotation with a contracted healthcare facility will be required to take a drug and alcohol test prior to the first clinical rotation. Further drug testing may be required for the student for cause and at the discretion of the College or the clinical agency. The cost of the drug testing will be the responsibility of the student.

Note: Some programs may require specific criminal background checks and drug testing based on specific requirements for that profession. Check with Admissions or the Program of Study if you have further questions.

Other Students - When cause exists as evidenced by disruptive behavior and/or transitory physical or mental impairment, a student suspected of being under the influence of a controlled substance, including illegal drugs and alcohol, may be requested to submit to a drug/alcohol test. Refusal to submit to the test is a violation of the Drug and Alcohol policy.

The College's Student Success Division has administrative responsibility for implementing and monitoring the drug and alcohol testing procedures for students. Inquiries related to these procedures should be directed to the Campus Dean of Students.

CONDUCT SANCTIONS

Student and employees who violate the established policies will be subject to disciplinary procedures.

Actions that may be taken include, but are not limited to, one or a combination of the following disciplinary sanctions:

- Verbal Warning/Written Disciplinary Warning
- Disciplinary Probation or Suspension
- Expulsion or Eviction from on-campus facilities/ programs
- Referral to an appropriate drug/alcohol treatment program

- College Service or Behavioral Requirements
- Loss of Privileges
- Confiscation of Prohibited Property
- Attendance at and/ or participation in an educational program
- Restitution for any damaged caused
- Fines
- · Housing Reassignment
- Housing Suspension or Expulsion
- · Eligibility Restriction

DRUG & ALCOHOL COUNSELING, TREATMENT AND REHABILITATION¹

COMMUNITY RESOURCES & TREATMENT OPTIONS

Numerous drug and alcohol counseling, treatment and rehabilitation centers are located within the 15-county area served by SCC. These services can provide information and assessment relating to drug and alcohol abuse as well as information about and referral to treatment options. SERVICES AVAILABLE THROUGH SCC

The SCC Counseling Assistance Program (CAPS) provides students with access to counseling and referrals free of charge through a partnership with masters-level counseling students from area universities. The **College Behavioral Profile** (CBP) is a web-based brief intervention program designed to reduce high-risk drinking, marijuana use and related harms among college students. The CBP can also reinforce low-risk behaviors and reaffirm those who choose to abstain from alcohol and marijuana use. The CBP utilizes personalized normative feedback and brief motivational intervention (BMI) to offer students information about their alcohol and marijuana use including risks, expectancies, perceptions of social norms, along with options for reducing problems and consequences that may be related to their use. The CBP may be used by college personnel as a standalone program for students identified as at risk for alcohol or marijuana related dependency or in tandem with programs such as BASICS and CHOICES.

Continuum EAP is available at no cost to full-time SCC employees. Counseling assistance is available via face-to-face meetings, telephone, and email. All Continuum assistance is confidential.
