Charitable IRA Rollover How It Works

The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012 extends the Charitable IRA Rollover through Dec. 31, 2013.

The law allows those age 70.5 and older to transfer up to \$100,000 from an IRA to a qualified charity, tax-free. If married, each spouse can transfer up to \$100,000 from his or her IRA.

You may direct gifts from your IRA to a qualified charitable organization in any amount up to \$100,000 throughout 2013. A CONTRACTOR OF CONTRACTOR OF

The gift must be made directly from the custodian of your IRA to the Southeast Community College Educational Foundation.

Your tax-free rollover gift will be excluded from your gross income.

Your gift can count toward your required minimum distribution.

Gifts to life income plans, donor-advised funds, supporting organizations, and most private foundations do not qualify.



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
In Their Own Words...

Kathy Davison Named Therapist of the Year

Kathy Davison was named the Nebraska Therapist of the Year at the NSRC State Conference in May.

Davison was nominated by Nan Nathenson, an NSRC board member and co-worker at Madonna Rehabilitation Center in Lincoln.

"Kathy is not a respiratory manager, director or educator. She is a floor therapist and proud of it," Nathenson said in her nomination letter. "Kathy willingly works with one of the most difficult-to-manage patient groups: long-term ventilator-dependent patients. She would not consider working anywhere else. Her unit has up to 32 ventilators running at any given time."

"Davison goes beyond the call of duty in many ways," Nathenson said. For example, when Davison is in a patient's room, "she will be singing the patient's favorite song. And that's the thing, she knows their favorite song! It is Kathy who can get a patient/resident to go to bingo, go to church or just get out of their room."

Another example of Davison's dedication was shown over the winter holiday. "Kathy worked on Christmas Eve," Nathenson said. "A snowstorm was coming, and she knew many staff would not make it to work. So she stayed overnight at the hospital and worked Christmas Day, which wasn't her shift."

Nathenson also cited Davison's standard of care and integrity. "Kathy ensures that she fully understands equipment, process and policy changes. She will tell you that she wants the handson experience because that is how she learns the best. Kathy participates in any and every educational event offered at her facility, state society and national organization."

"Kathy is on the front lines of patient care day after day, with her clinical strengths and loving heart, giving her patients and colleagues support. You cannot help but smile and be cheered up by her effervescence and positivity." (Article reprinted with permission by NSRC)

1978 SCC Graduate Tim Pratt Utilizes Skills



Have you ever wondered who is responsible for the 400 traffic signals and 50+ traffic cameras in Lincoln? It's Tim Pratt. Or, the 90 miles of fiber optic communication lines and 100+ wireless point-to-point radio systems? Again, Tim. And, add in management of 550 users in the Public Works Department, 350 computers, 25 servers and water and wastewater SCADA control systems.

How does a 1978 graduate of Drafting Technology (now Computer Aided Design Technology) get to this point? Growing up in a home that did not place a high value on education, Tim chose not to take his father's advice, "give up on education and get a real job!" After graduation from SCC, Tim worked at Lincoln Public Schools for 20+ years. Tim said, "I had and continue to have a natural interest in

drawing and architecture. I was always fascinated with big construction projects and how an odd combination of elements come together to create a building, street or bridge." In the early 1980s, his duties were comprised of drafting plans for construction on a drafting table with an old time "drafting machine" and a Leroy lettering tool. When LPS jumped headlong into the CAD world, he developed dual professional personalities, one dedicated to planning and project coordination and the other dedicated to implementation of computer technologies. In 1999, Pratt obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from Doane College in Public Administration. His dual professional personalities followed him to the city of Lincoln Public Works in 1999 where he is responsible for a team of staff supporting technology. Over the years, Public Works has pushed for a number of enterprise initiatives to be implemented: Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) phones, Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) services and enterprise content management. Benes said, "It wasn't really between me and these other chefs; I was competing against myself to try to make this dish the best I've ever made it.

Getting a medal not just at NACUFS, but from the ACF, is really important to me; it's such a high standard." His heritage inspired this dish, German and Czech-style holiday dinners with duck and sauerkraut. "My favorite meal of the year," he says. "I wanted to draw on my childhood nostalgia. And cassoulet is just a simple, classic, French dish. I wanted to keep it simple and keep it flavorful."



Professional Truck Driver Training Grads **Compete in Truck Driver Championship**


