My Nursing Career Journey

The one word that comes to mind in my career and life is perseverance. Few people can achieve great things without first overcoming a few obstacles.

After graduating high school I completed the Administrative Secretary program at SCC-Lincoln, which led me to a variety of jobs in that field. I often thought about returning to college to further my education, but life and my family took over. With each year that passed my confidence in returning to college lessened. In 1991, I decided to take the leap and returned to college at SCC-Beatrice in the nursing program. As a non-traditional student, I chose Beatrice because of its excellent reputation, the classroom structure and size, and the support system available.

My journey began with the usual prerequisite courses. My confidence grew with each class I completed. I entered the Practical Nursing program with limited experience in health care, which made my path challenging at times. Priscilla Allen, Program Chair, and instructors Crystal Higgins, Karen Stevens, Mary Hobus, and Barb Hamel, were a great team. Each individual teaching style motivated me to-earth instructors at SCC Beatrice really helped as I started farming and ranching.

I have so many memories from my time at SCC, from running the combine in Bill Slater's class to figuring rations with Mark Goes. All the while I was able to meet great friends on and off campus. I graduated in May 1997 with a degree in agriculture business and was off to UNL to pursue my bachelor's degree in agriculture economics.

When I finished my time at UNL, I came home and joined the family row crop operation. I also started a small cow-calf herd thanks to the appreciation for cattle production I learned from instructor Goes. After returning home I married my wife, Natalie, who graduated in 2005 from the Practical Nursing program. She then worked as an LPN while she pursued her RN degree at Bryan and Cloud County Community College. She has been a nurse at Thayer County Community Hospital since 2005. She and I have four daughters, Addison, Leah, Brynn, and Kora. We enjoy our small-town life and are involved in many community organizations. Giving our time back is the least we can do to keep our community strong. From serving on church groups and cattle boards to being a volunteer

through their strong leadership, compassion, laughter, energy and support, which were major influences in making my educational journey successful.

On my first clinical day, I provided hands-on care to "real" patients. Crystal was very surprised that I returned to school the next day. Mary was small, but mighty. I can still hear her say, "If it's not documented, you didn't do it!" With Mary, you knew immediately if you were in trouble. Her blue eyes would sparkle, her stance would widen and she would point and state, "To the Chapel." Karen, a.k.a. Steve Martin, just made you laugh! Her demonstrations of different diagnosis were priceless. Barb shared her knowledge in nursing in a comforting tone and expected the best from each student.

SCC-Beatrice prepared me for my first job as a LPN at Crete Municipal Hospital, now Crete Area Medical Center. During this time I also attended Bryan School of Nursing, where I obtained my Associates Degree in Nursing. I continued to work at Crete Area Medical Center for 20 years as a registered nurse. I worked as a floor nurse for one year and then was asked to develop and create their cardiac rehabilitation high school basketball coach for many years, it has all been worth it.

Recently, I helped start the Titan Beef Boosters in our school district. This group brings fresh, local, high-guality beef to the students at Thaver Central Community Schools. I'm proud to have helped bring more than 30 local cattlemen together to donate a beef animal during the next three years. We also have had more than 80 businesses and individuals provide monetary support to the Titan Beef Boosters. With this program, we are feeding our children better beef more frequently. Not only are they benefiting nutritionally, we are showing them what can happen when small communities work together. We also are able to promote beef production and agriculture. This is a win-win situation, and I think we can work to make this sustainable for years to come. As of January 2016, there have been close to 12 other schools that have implemented a similar program or are getting close to starting one.

In Their Own Words

Growing up in a rural area near Gladstone, NE, afforded the opportunity to attend eight years of grade school in Gladstone and four years of high school at Fairbury. Fairbury Junior College was a good fit to further an education based on location

and affordability. Earning a General Agriculture Degree at FJC (1961-62 & 1962-63) plus the opportunities and experiences gained through serving as a class officer, Executive Council and Phi Theta Kappa helped provide the encouragement and incentive to eventually earn a four-year degree. While at FJC an opportunity to assist the Nebraska Game & Parks Commission conduct a fish population survey at Crystal Springs just south of Fairbury strongly suggested that a Fish & Wildlife Biologist career would be a good career choice.

Utah State University at Logan, UT, was eventually selected for further education based on accredability standards and affordability. In spite of decent grades and being selected for a couple of scholastic honorary fraternities, a change from education was needed. USU graduation date with a B.S. degree in Fish & Wildlife Management was December, 1966 and volunteering for Army duty during the Vietnam crisis was also December, 1966. Four months of basic training and advanced individual training at Fort Leonard Wood, MO, and six months of Army combat engineering officers training at Belvoir, VA, earned an assistant supply officer post at Fort Riley, KS. After volunteering for foreign duty and attending jungle training in Panama orders provided duty in cold Korea. Due



to a shortage of senior officers, duties included some of us filling these senior positions at battalion and group level supply. Serving as prosecution and defense council for court martial cases was additional duty. Being in charge of a large military lumber yard made it possible to provide much needed lumber to underdeveloped communities and schools and teach

English to Korean students on some weekends.

Upon being discharged from active duty in late 1969 an invitation from an Indian friend living in a village on the island of Hoonah, AK, was accepted in May, 1970. The summer was spent commercial salmon fishing and working

for a fish cannery.



By August, 1970 mandatory Army orders required leaving Alaska to spend another three years serving in reserve units in Fairbury, Lincoln and North Platte, NE.

The desire to work for the NGPC, except for summer employment while in college, was a long time coming. During the long waiting period for a position opening other employment included pollution lab control technician, pipe line construction, life insurance salesman and park ranger. In 1972 a hatchery biologist position at the North Platte Fish Hatchery provided a NGPC job working with three additional state hatcheries and several private hatcheries improving fish propagation techniques, equipment and assisting in implementing a statewide fish disease inspection program in cooperation with the US Fish & Wildlife Service. During this 10-year period the Vocational Technical School at North Platte provided the opportunity to obtain a Building & Construction Certificate while attending night classes. The next two years were spent away from the NGPC involving a failed private hatchery venture. A technician position at the North Platte Fish Hatchery was obtained in 1984 for a few months before moving to Crawford, NE, as an assistant hatchery superintendent at the former US Fish & Wildlife Service hatchery. In 1991 the opportunity and privilege to become the fish and wildlife program manager and play a role in the construction, equipping and staffing of a new modern multi-million dollar hatchery below the Calamus Reservoir near Burwell, NE, became a reality. Approximately 22 years were spent involved in the production of cold, cool and warm water species of fish to enhance fishing and recreational opportunities for Nebraska residents and other sportspersons.

My wife, Linda, who unselfishly sacrificed her teaching career for mine for the last 35 plus years finally convinced me to retire in July 2013. We retired to our small acreage near Fairbury to a home we mostly built ourselves over the past 15 years with the help of some local contractors, family and friends. Current organization involvement includes Nebraska Chapter of the American Fisheries Society, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. VFW and American Legion Honor Guard duty to honor deceased veterans and their families will remain high on the list of things to do. God has blessed us with reasonably good health, a wonderful home, a few good friends and acquaintances. We enjoy some volunteer work, but only to people and places that need and appreciate help. We hope to continue enjoying gardening, the wood burning stove in the winter, photography, getting back to oil and acrylic painting, hunting, trapping, fishing and U.S. travel for many years into the future.

Choristers (chorus students) lived and breathed music for a solid two months as they prepared for the television appearance March 3, 1963, on the KOLN-TV program "College of the Air." Fairbury Junior College was the only junior college among 11 colleges to be selected for the honor.



In June 1993, the Beatrice Campus played host to a trio of visitors from the former Soviet Union. These men were Ag officials from the countries of Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan. The men, along with interpreters and an assistant dean of the International Programs Division of UNL's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, met with Agriculture **Business & Management Technology** program chair, Blayne Glissman, and toured the program facilities as part of the two-week study program at the IANR. One of the visitors expressed an interest in an exchange program when the SCC tour had barely begun.

Ken Trubey, a 1958 FJC graduate, was inducted into the inaugural Hall of Fame class at Ord High School. The Mankato, KS, native was recruited by Red Grovert to play basketball. While at Fairbury he was selected to the Nebraska Five Junior College All-Conference Team, with the 1958 team going to the National Junior College Tournament. After graduating from Kearney State College in 1960 he started his teaching career at Ord High School.

As head varsity boys basketball coach from 1964-1977 he had a record of 208-86, winning 70 percent of his games. His teams won three Central Conference Championships, made seven state appearances and eight teams finished the season rated in the top 10 in Class B. The 1974 team was undefeated during the regular season and ranked No. 1 entering the State Tournament, finishing with a 22-1 record.

In 1976 Ken was selected as head coach of the North All-Star basketball team. It was the first year the game was played at two sites, with the North Team winning both games. After retirement from coaching, Ken received the Level I and Level II Carrier Awards from the Nebraska Coaches Association.

Coach Bargen called Robert Eubanks to see if they could get together while he was in D.C., and Robert came to his hotel that evening, and he and Gary spent a couple of hours talking. Robert is retired after serving as a fireman for 29 years. He now does freelance photography. Cornell Jones, the first player Coach Bargen recruited from the D.C. area to play at Fairbury, stopped by the hotel the next evening on his way home from basketball practice for a couple of hours of reminiscing. He is retired from education, but helps as an assistant basketball coach at a private high school in Virginia.

After five years of college as undeclared and pre-Pharmacy at other colleges, I decided to seek a different career path and chose Radiologic Technology. To this day I wish I had initially chosen SCC but would have probably questioned myself not attempting my first desire to explore the field of Pharmacy.

Upon graduation, I began my career at Lincoln General Hospital and worked with general radiography, tomography, emergency and trauma radiography. Computer Aided Design Drafting Updates

The Computer Aided Design Drafting program has been located on the Lincoln Campus since 1973. During this time the program has seen two locations, four program chairs, and a handful of outstanding faculty and adjunct instructors. In April 2015 the CADD program was relocated to a newly renovated, state-of-the-art space within the SCC Lincoln Campus, which will accommodate the program needs for growth and incorporation of technology that was not previously available. The CADD program also has classes represented in the Engineering Pathway at The Career Academy where students can achieve dual credit for college programs while in high school.

In July 2016 the CADD program will be consolidating with the Architectural-Engineering Technology program at the Milford Campus. The two programs will merge to form the **Design Drafting Technology Program** and within the program will have a CADD focus and an Architectural focus. The CADD focus will remain on the Lincoln Campus and will consist of faculty members Todd Roth (program co-chair), David Zachek and Charles Hildebrand. Hildebrand joined the CADD program as full-time faculty in July 2015 and also is teaching in the Engineering Pathway at TCA. Charles previously had a 20-year tenure with Cleaver-Brooks, holding several manufacturing positions including design lead. Zachek began teaching as an adjunct instructor in 2013 and became a full-time faculty member in July 2015. He was the Senior Designer with IAC Acoustics and brings experience overseeing and managing a team of designers, facilitating solutions for the operations department and mentoring and training the design team.

The Architectural focus will remain on the Milford Campus and will consist of

faculty members Paul Buell (program co-chair), Wendy Love and Karen Koch. Students will be able to enter the DDRT program and determine their desired focus as they pursue their academic goals. The program also will be offering several academic certificates for students or individuals from industry who desire further training for their careers.

"I have always been interested in how things are made and enjoy problem solving, so the CADD program seemed like the best decision for my career goals. As a structural detailer at Concrete Industries, my role



has continued to change and evolve. In addition to drafting, I now help train new employees and schedule the production of one of the products for CI, and have also been involved in various stages of product testing. Recent projects include the Lincoln Public Schools buildings, including the Marilyn Moore Middle School/Copple YMCA. I work with a great team that works well together, especially on the large projects such as Pinnacle Bank Arena, the parking garages south of the arena, Breslow Ice Arena, The Career Academy, and many other projects throughout Nebraska. In Their Own Words

"I am a proud December 1992 graduate of SCC-Milford. I have many fond memories of the time I studied at SCC-Milford. One thing



stands out to me the most. On my first day of my first quarter, we had a room full of people in my class. When I graduated, there were just five of us left. The whole time I studied it was clear that if you were not prepared to put in enough work to move on to the next quarter, you definitely didn't.

By no means did I get the best grades in my class, nor was I ever mentioned in the student-of-the-quarter discussions. Yet, I did what I had to do to make sure that I graduated. I had big shoes to fill. My grandfather, Gene Cripe, and my uncle, Robert Knoop, also went to SCC-Milford for Manufacturing Engineering. They were both top of their class and both received student-of-the-quarter awards. Even though I was not as gifted in the classroom as they were, I always felt the need to carry on where my family had been before me. Little did I know that my degree from SCC-Milford would take me around the world and back, to places I never dreamed of.

After graduating from SCC, I spent a short period building houses. I did not have a great grade-point average, so

finding and getting interviews was difficult. I got some help from my grandfather and uncle when they recommended me to one of their suppliers. My grandfather worked for Hoover in Beatrice, and my uncle worked for Plymouth Manufacturing not far from Beatrice. I was hired as a draftsman at Gits Manufacturing, Inc. in Creston, IA, I was promoted several times. from draftsman to project engineer, from project engineer to design engineer. I received U.S. patents for a pneumatic waste gate actuator that controls turbochargers. I was then promoted to project manager in charge of a new startup factory in Thailand. In less than 18 months, we had a new CNC and assembly facility up and running in Thailand.

In 1999, I went to work for Coleman Outdoor Products in Wichita, KS, as the head manufacturing engineer on the metals side. It was here that I earned my Six Sigma Black Belt. The company was suffering because of up and coming competitors in Asia. I decided that I needed to see who and what we were dealing with as manufacturers. I resigned from Coleman in 2000, sold everything I owned and moved to Asia.

I arrived in Thailand in 2000 with everything I owned in five suitcases. I got a job helping with a new startup factory making BBQ grills and hot water heaters for luxury boats. That lasted a year, and the rollercoaster ride was on. I spent almost 12 years in Asia. I was project lead on multiple manufacturing move projects. I would go to the western countries, learn the machines and how to run them, then fly back to Asia and teach them how to do it. I spent two years contracted to General Motors as a supplier quality engineer where I received extensive experience in lean manufacturing. After that I bounced around from project to project. I spent time at a stainless steel casting foundry, a large forging/machining factory, a ball bearing manufacturing company, as well as a plastic injection molding factory. As an American engineer who could speak the local language as well as English, there was never a shortage of work to be found. I lived and worked in countries such as Thailand, China, Jordan, Australia, and Taiwan. I have a passport showing that I have traveled to more countries than most people could imagine.

In 2011, I had the chance to move myself and my family back to the United States. In fact, back to my hometown of Beatrice. I took a job as a manufacturing engineer at Neapco. There I spent more than four years and was promoted from manufacturing engineer to senior supplier development engineer to lean manufacturing coordinator.

In September 2015, I accepted a position with NSK Bearings in Clarinda, IA. I am currently the Advanced Production Systems Manager (Toyota Production Systems). In my resume under education, it still only reads Associate Degree from SCC-Milford. A degree from SCC-Milford is a powerful thing to have.

Upon graduating from Arapahoe, NE, high school in 1961, as the eldest of 18 children raised on a small dairy/ turkey farm, having learned how to repair

equipment when broken I wanted to study ag at UNL but my family had no funds for that, nor did I. In high school vocational ag we had learned a little welding and building of farm equipment, so I enrolled in welding at what was then Nebraska Vocational Technical School in Milford. My VoAg teacher thought I should take a broader field like auto body, so I changed to that, despite having never even been inside a body shop.

I had asked for any jobs available there to help work my way through school, and Mr. (Lowell) Welsh, Bob Eicher and Paul Ackerman all got me to work with the maintenance department doing many varied jobs for Glenn Weaver, Kenneth Becker, Carl Schroeder, and Burdette Boshart. I also learned to operate heavy equipment working on the grounds, gaining knowledge in many areas that also helped me in later life.

After graduation in 1963, I worked at Rolfsmeier Motors in Seward, NE, in the newly built body shop for a number of years, then at Don Lester Ford, and then as body shop manager when it became Brockmeier Ford. I married Lee Ann Wood in 1964, and we had three sons, Tony, Allen and Patrick. Tony also graduated from SCC in Diesel Mechanics in 1985, and his daughter carried on the tradition, graduating from SCC in Graphic Design in 2012.

By 1970 other areas in that field interested me, and after some study I was hired by Lincoln Auto Damage Appraisers as an independent auto damage appraiser in Lincoln. After the owner's death and sale of the business, in 1976 Lee Ann and I formed Midwest Auto & Truck Appraisers, Inc. which we operated for 36 years, using my knowledge gleaned from SCC. My job was to estimate the damage and/or appraise the value on cars, heavy trucks, trailers, RVs, motorcycles, boats, farm equipment, mechanical inspections, handle heavy equipment, special interest vehicles, and specialty assignments. I retired in 2012.

Douglas Janak works in town four days a week, tends to more than 300 acres on his farm in Bennet. NE. and raises Charolais cattle. But to hear him tell it. he's no busier than anybody else. In



fact, he seems undaunted by what must be round-the-clock demands on his time, not to mention his wallet. Sure, he admits there are challenges, but he chooses to focus on the personal rewards of farming. "It gets in your blood. It's peaceful, away from the hustle-bustle of everyday life."

He describes essentially losing himself in his daily chores. "You can get away from the phone, away from the computer. That's something most people can't do." He's got that right. While the rest of the world is often forced to connect to the office above all else, Janak simply connects to his land. And though he is quick to point out that his acreage is small compared to others, he is equally proud of his cattle and his crops.

As mentioned, Janak raises Charolais, as well as corn, soybeans, brome and alfalfa hay. When asked about the challenges that come from yielding results, he mentioned the weather, as one might expect, but said the biggest issue stems from price swings.

"It used to be that corn could change 10 cents in a week, now it can change 25-30 cents in two hours."

Weather and pricing can hardly be

controlled, but equipment failure another challenge faced by farmers - is something he does his best to minimize. The Janak family has been loyal Shoup customers since 1996, buying replacement parts as needed. And on this subject he was frank, "When you need it, you need it. Downtime in farming can quickly take things from bad to worse, so Shoup's reliability and extensive stock makes them a crucial resource."

Janak lives and works a careful balance. He's proud of the tradition handed down from his father, and soon he'll introduce that tradition to his daughter. "I want to give her some experiences that city kids don't have. Give her some diversity in her life."

Who knows? Maybe one day she'll follow in her father's footsteps.
