# Types of scholarships available for donations:

• Annual Fund: Donation made on annual basis by a person or organization. That donation is used each year to provide scholarships to students who meet the established eligibility criteria.

- Endowed Fund: Requires a minimum contribution of \$5,000 and can be added to at any time. The principal remains in place in perpetuity, and only the interest earned each year is used to fund student scholarships. Begining July 1, 2017, our interest rate being credited to endowed accounts will be 5.0 percent. This rate is reviewed and set every six months by the SCC Educational Foundation Board.

#### **Keith Muller Receives State Award**

Fairbury native and Wilber-Clatonia High School athletic director, Keith Muller, received the state Athletic Administrator of the Year in 2016. The honor was awarded by the Nebraska State Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association at their spring banquet. Although not his first award, Muller was chosen as the 2011-2012 District I AD of the year and the NSASSP Region I Assistant Principal of the Year for 2012-2013, the 1978 Southeast Community College-Fairbury graduate, said he was humbled and honored to be selected.

Keith was honored again this past January when the National High School Athletic Coaches Association advanced him to a finalist for national coach of the year in the area of Athletic Director. The Nebraska School Activities Association selected him based on longevity, service to high school

sports and much more. The finalists will be honored during The National Coach of the Year Banquet during their national convention in East Peoria, Illinois where the selections will be made on June 21.

#### In Their Own Words

Editor's note: Dennis Zabel recently retired, which allowed him time to reflect on key turning points that changed his life and career.

"I graduated from Fairbury High School in 1965 without much serious thought about what to do next. I thought about attending a tech school (Milford) to learn diesel technology, but instead registered for classes at Fairbury Junior College, one of the institutions of higher learning that later became part of SCC. That decision made all the difference. I was the first in my family to attend and eventually graduate from college.

"Once classes started at FJC, I set my goal to eventually graduate from the University of Nebraska. Away from the daily drama and regimen of high school, it was easier to settle down and enjoy learning, and I developed a desire to better understand how the world works. And, since FJC was close to home, it was economical.

"I give credit to George Johnson, (agriculture and biology) instructor at FJC, for nudging me in the right direction and for giving me a good reference for my first job interview. While Mr. Johnson and most of the other instructors at FJC from that time have long ago passed, their legacy lives on within us.

"My two-year degree in Agriculture from FJC was excellent preparation for attending UNL beginning in the fall of 1967. I graduated from UNL in the summer of 1969.

"My life has been one adventure after another. After graduating from UNL I was drafted into military service. After a year of training stateside. I served a year with a reconnaissance unit in the 1st Cavalry Division gathering intelligence on the ground in Vietnam. The U.S. Army kept me

busy for nearly all of 1970 and 1971.

"Most of my jobs through the years required a college degree. The very first was as a soil conservationist with what used to be called the Soil Conservation Service, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Today it's known as the Natural **Resources Conservation** Service. I was transferred to several work locations in Nebraska and Minnesota.

"Later, after farming a few years, another opportunity knocked on my door. It led to becoming an agronomist

for a fertilizer manufacturer with national exposure. And that led to positions as an agronomist with more responsibilities with other companies. All required a college degree to get a foot in the door. I traveled back and forth across the country educating our clients on how to best use the company's products.

"I retired two years ago from the Nutra-Flo Company, headquartered in North Sioux City, S.D. I worked as agronomist and photographer for its marketing department. The company needed pictures of crops and agricultural equipment for advertising purposes. I caught the photography bug, which led to numerous personal trips to some of the most beautiful locations in the country, and I met a lot of interesting people along the way.

"If I were a college student today, I think I'd still want to major in an agriculturerelated field, but with more training in climate science. About 20,000 career-level jobs in agriculture go unfilled in the U.S. every year. Crop breeders using genetically modified organism technology will be

needed more than ever to rapidly adapt crops to a changing climate. Learning to manage crops through increased weather stress and more frequent severe storms will keep future agronomists busy.

"Considering whether to attend a community college or a four-year school is a decision that is different for each student. Each type of school has advantages and disadvantages. For me, I'd look at my nearest community college to see what's offered and whether it fits my long-term goals. English 101, for example, is about the same everywhere. It's the same for basic courses in history, chemistry, physics, and the others that most students must take early in their college careers. It makes sense for most students, I believe, to take those courses at a community college.

"Without taking those first steps into a classroom at Fairbury Junior College, it's hard to imagine that the most interesting accomplishments of my life could ever have happened."

#### In Their Own Words

"I remember the close personalized attention in SCC classes. If I didn't understand something (which happened quite a bit), the instructors would stop the lesson and go over it for me because they understood that if one student was not getting it, then others may not be as well. I am so grateful to SCC for REALLY educating me! I am surprised at how much education I received from SCC that I use on a daily basis.

"I graduated from SCC in December 1985 with a degree in building construction, but I knew that to compete, I needed at least a bachelor's degree. I didn't know what that was until I began working at Beatrice State Developmental Center and became interested in physical therapy. I then joined the U.S. Air Force and used the G.I. Bill to help pay for college.

"After graduating from the University of Nebraska Omaha with a bachelor's degree in biology, my first job was as a chemical technician at Dow Chemical's polyolefins and elastomers research and development. The irony is that I told Mr. (Bob) Eddy in my SCC chemistry class that I would NEVER use polymer chemistry! In his wisdom (that I didn't comprehend at the time), he said 'You just never know.' So after he found out where I was working, I had to eat my words!

"After eight years of building and running chemical pilot plants (small research plants from lab scale to 130 feet tall covering one city block), I applied for the position of technical advisor in Dow's Freeport, Texas, Environmental Operations - Thermal Treatment. The position provides technical guidance and

expertise for all plant operations and guides and coaches operators, engineers and operations leadership to properly operate the plants.

"Nothing happens in the plant that the technical advisor does not allow. Troubleshooting major problems in the plant also is a big part of the job, so that means some phone calls in the middle of the night. Another part of the job (my favorite), is to make improvements to our plants. My latest major improvement was on a Thermatrix Flameless Thermal Oxidizer. The project was to take a dual reactor plant being utilized at 40 percent of capacity, idle one reactor while directing the vent load to the other reactor at

80-percent utilization. The project won a Dow Chemical WRAP (Waste Reduction Always Pays) award and an American Chemistry Council's **Energy Efficiency** Award for Dow. This project saves natural gas (about 200 million standard cubic feet per vear) and reduces the CO<sub>2</sub> emissions that would have resulted. This was a great opportunity to save money and reduce CO<sub>2</sub> (greenhouse gas) emissions.

"If we could have stayed in Beatrice

with the same type of opportunity as Dow offered, we would have. It is nice not to have to shovel snow, but being so far from our hometown and family members has been tough. Lake Jackson is a beautiful city and has become our home. We do miss Valentino's pizza and, of course, Runza!

"I met my wife, Marissa, in Mr. Eddy's chemistry lab, so we both look back at SCC with very fond memories. We have three daughters, and attending their school activities takes up our free time!

"I am deeply grateful for the education I received from SCC, and I always speak fondly of my instructors."

While listening to many speakers, they covered topics such as water laws, leadership and current water events happening state wide. By attending this academy, everyone is able to have multiple connections with others across the state. #### Class of 2006 Alumnus Inspires Patients Every Chance He Gets

When it comes to inspiring patients, Rick Haith is somewhat of an expert. He draws on his own personal experience for inspiration.

"I not only show people by my example that they too can live independently despite having a disability," Haith said, "but to also steer individuals down a path that will allow them to reach their fullest potential."

About 16 years ago Rick was involved in a tragic car accident that killed his friend and left Haith paralyzed. While recovering in a hospital bed, he was motivated by a doctor who was in a wheelchair. He realized there can be a fulfilling life after an accident, and he wanted to make that happen.

Rick graduated from Southeast Community College's Academic Transfer program on the Beatrice Campus in 2006. He transferred to the University of

Nebraska-Omaha and graduated in 2009 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education in Therapeutic Recreation. He was the Honors Convocation winner for earning the top spot in recreational therapy.

Haith now works at Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital in Lincoln as a recreational therapist. He is able to work with spinal cord patients at the same facility where he was treated following his car accident.

He recently received two awards from the Lincoln Tennis Association and the Nebraska Tennis Association for his work in developing and implementing a youth adaptive tennis program. The goal is to provide individuals with disabilities the skills to play tennis against ablebodied peers.

"To be completely honest with you, I do not develop and implement programs for individuals with disabilities in order to win awards," Haith said, "I create and run these programs with the ultimate goal of enriching people's lives."

Rick recently was inducted into the EducationQuest

Hall of Fame. He was a past recipient of EducationQuest's "Reaching Your Potential Scholarship Program" which helped him pay for his education at SCC. He was selected for achieving success after overcoming tremendous obstacles and for serving as an inspiration to others.



The ECED Program will always be an important part of my life and it is wonderful to keep up with the growth, positive changes/additions, and the overall news of the program and college by continuing to stay connected with former and current ECED faculty and staff. Through social media and many chance meetings in the community, I have been able to keep in contact with former students, former professional contacts, and parents of former students, even those from my 1970 preschool years. Surprisingly, we all remember each other even though some of them have grown taller and some of us have grown older.

I would consider all students who were able to succeed and feel good about themselves, a success. I was always drawn to the student who came into the program feeling doubt about themselves and their ability to succeed, be it academically, financially or lack of selfesteem. I have watched many of these students graduate from the program, go on for higher degrees, find employment

and become wonderful parents and even grandparents. It is the dream of every educator to make a difference in the world through the children or adults whose lives they have touched. My mantra was and still is, Find a job you love and you will never have to work a day in your life. I thank SCC for awarding me this luxury!"

#### Pat Wagner AWS Scholarship

The American Welding Society created the Pat Wagner Scholarship to be awarded as an academic and need-based scholarship to Welding Technology students. The local American Welding Society donated \$8,000 and the national AWS matched the scholarship for a total of \$20,000. Two \$500 scholarships will be awarded annually. #### 2016 Welding Technology Graduate Places in U.S. Weld Invitational

Traveling to the U.S. Weld Invitational Skills Contest in Huntsville, Alabama, was surreal for Drake McNally, 2016 Welding Technology graduate. McNally said, "It was guite a journey to go through the U.S. Weld Trials."

After winning the state competition in Omaha, he competed in the SkillsUSA National welding competition held in Louisville, Kentucky and placed fourth, competing with approximately 100 high school and post-secondary students across the United States. Placing fourth in the competition was an incredible accomplishment given the competition. By competing in the national competition, McNally was invited to participate in the American Welding Society U.S. Invitational Pre-trials, the start of a lengthy process of selecting the next young welder to represent the U.S. at the WorldSkills competition. The Pre-trials required competitors to submit welded joints and structures by mail to be judged by experts. The scoring criteria is stricter than any welding code in existence and with tight deadlines. McNally was six out of a total of 22 competitors that advanced to compete at the next stage of the U.S. Weld Invitational in Huntsville, AL.

Competitors at the Weld Trials had to be proficient in many forms of welding including SMAW, GTAW, FCAW, and GMAW. During the 18 hour competition, competitors worked to make near

perfect welds on test plates and welded structures that would also be subjected to destructive bend and pressure testing. McNally did not advance to



the final stage where the top three will compete for a chance to go to Dubai to determine the U.S. World Skill welder. He said, "I would do it over again in a heartbeat. The experience of challenging myself at such a high level along with meeting some of the best welders in the industry was definitely life changing and worth every second."

McNally's efforts were supported by the business community with donations of practice materials from TMCO, Tuttle, Inc., and Shanahan Mechanical & Electrical. Dan Zabel, Co-Program Chair of Welding Technology, accompanied McNally to the competitions and helped judge the competition along with the attending advisors. Zabel said, "It was exciting to see McNally participate at a national competition so competitively."

#### **SCC Graduate Sets Sights on 2020 Paralympics**



With four National Wheelchair Tennis titles in just three years, Taylor Graham is a name to watch. "Four years ago after my motorcycle accident, I would have laughed if someone had told me I would obtain the goals I have now reached in a wheelchair", said Graham, 2016 Welding Technology graduate.

Initially, it was the weekly challenge

of matches with others from Madonna Rehabilitation teams that led into local and national tournaments. Graham shared, "Travel season begins soon with tournaments in Kansas City and Atlanta, Georgia. Winning the Men's B Doubles title with my partner, Jack Spicer, at the 2016 U.S. Open Wheelchair Tennis Tournament in St. Louis was a definite motivator to keep training. I want to play with the best of the best and that means playing in the Open division." Ranked eighth nationally in the Open division, he plays both doubles and singles, but prefers singles. Graham admits he keeps a grueling schedule with private lessons as he works toward the goal of reaching the 2020 Paralympics in Tokyo. Looking back, he said, "I'm proud of the physical and emotional hurdles I've overcome but honestly, I'll be even happier if I am selected to play in the 2020 Paralympics."

#### In Their Own Words



Hello, I'm Bob McChesney, graduate of Diesel Technology, Class of 1966. NVTS's (Nebraska Vocational Technical School) curriculum appealed to me since I wanted to work for a Caterpillar dealership, and the industry was very choosey in who they hired. My instructors were able to teach the theory and also relate studies to the "iron" out in the shop and in my classroom studies. They made me a believer in, "If you don't know how it works, you can't properly repair it". At enrollment time to NVTS in 1964, Vietnam wasn't a concern. However, after graduation in 1966, Vietnam was "HOT" so I enlisted in the division of Construction Mechanic in the U.S. Navy Seabees. My education at NVTS advanced me to 2nd class Petty Officer immediately. I became a top mechanic and was called upon many times for my mechanical knowledge. I made two deployments to Vietnam with NMCB 9 during 1967, 1968 and 1969.

After the military, I started my career in the service department of Nebraska Machinery, a Caterpillar dealership in North Platte, Nebraska. One day, I was contacted by Morrison Knudeson of Boise, Idaho to join their group to work on the Alaskan pipeline. I turned it down due to the frigid weather conditions. In

1979, I had an accident and was asked if I would be interested in becoming a service training instructor. It required many trips to Peoria, Illinois. I was certified by Caterpillar as truck engine instructor, machine instructor and also small and large bore engine instructor during the years of 1991 thru 2002. I have had students from Saudi Arabia, Japan, Scotland, Canada and almost every state in the Union. I've provided classes 1500 feet underground in a Trona Mine, Coal Strip Mines, Vo-Tech's, Junior Colleges, customer shops and dealer classrooms. I've been a local, state, and national judge for VICA (Vocational Industrial Club of America), been on the advisory board for the Wichita, Kansas Area Technical School and Salina, Kansas Vo-Tech

School. Later in time I got another call from Fabick Caterpillar dealership from St. Louis, Missouri asking if I would be interested in being a heavy equipment maintenance supervisor which would bring a salary of a quarter of a million dollars every six months for two years, tax free.

During my final years, before retirement. Caterpillar had just finished producing 12 of the 797 dump trucks, the world's largest. I was to receive three of them and the proving grounds in Arizona would receive the other nine. Six months later. I received 21 train cars of pieces. parts, and drawings to assemble the three trucks. Today those trucks are in operation in the coal mines of Wyoming. This story could continue for many pages of the people and places I have been due to the Caterpillar industry.

But my reason for writing this letter today happened BEFORE Caterpillar. It all started at NVTS, where I got a GREAT foundation for all my training. I will always remember my roots at NVTS and have tried to present classes as an instructor that had real value, no matter the subject, as I had received from Nebraska Vocational Technical School.

My true passion is building things. I made a living in the concrete and carpentry construction industry with a hobby on the side of building furniture and other things for myself and my family. 
