

SCC BEATRICE ALUMNUS IS "SPORTSCASTER OF THE YEAR"



In January, Lincoln radio station KFOR's **Jeff Motz** was named Nebraska's 2020 Sportscaster of the Year by the National Media Sports Association. Motz graduated from the Mass Media program on SCC's Beatrice Campus in 2000.

"This award is nice; it's hard to believe I was nominated," Motz said. "We have in this state a good network of sportscasters who are truly deserving of this award. I can't thank enough my co-workers and my family who are very supportive of what I do."

Motz has worked at KFOR since 2006. In addition to sports, doing

covering news, he also has his own website business where he livestreams sports. He said his time at SCC helped shape his future career in sportscasting.

"The handson experience is what I remember," Motz said. "I learned the ins and outs of the business."

Motz first became interested in broadcasting when he took a journalism class in high school. He attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln for

a year, but ended up taking some general education classes at SCC's Lincoln Campus before entering the Mass Media program in Beatrice.

During his time on the Beatrice Campus, there was a campus radio station, KQIQ, where students could get real experience. He said the facility was brand new, making it nicer than some of the other local stations. One of his instructors, Jerry Fritz, made quite the impact on Motz.

"Jerry made things fun and enjoyable," he said. "He was caring and a disciplinarian. "I have nothing but great memories of him. A lot of it has applied to what I do in the world today."

Motz worked at KLIN radio in Lincoln after graduation, and then went on to KFOR. This summer he will have worked 24 years in broadcasting and can call himself a veteran.

"I'm very thankful I've had these opportunities along the way," he said.

Motz covers both news and sports and has covered many important stories over the years, including the Hallam tornado in 2004. He remembers going into work at 7 a.m. and doing news updates over the course of the entire day and night, and not going home until around 12:30 a.m.

"You realize when you look back, you probably saved a lot more lives," he said. "People turn on the radio and they rely on this information."

Even though Motz enjoys covering both, sports is his true love. From his time as an athlete at Northeast High School in Lincoln, sports has been a way of life for him. He also is the play-by-play announcer for Nebraska Wesleyan football and basketball.

"The best part of my job is sitting down and doing the play-by-play of the game," he said. "I'm enjoying something I truly like to do."

SCC discontinued the Mass Media program in 2008. However, along the way it had an impact on many students, including Jeff Motz.

"I can't thank SCC enough for what they did and the type of person I've become," Motz said.

When Motz is not calling sports or covering breaking news, he is spending time with his wife Jami, his daughter Tenaj and his son Jered. *

"You always have to be exploring and growing in the understanding of new ideas and technology to implement those tools, whether mechanical or financial, that will have the best chance to bring greater efficiency to the operation." Medow hopes to eventually scale back his involvement and spend more time with his grandchildren. Until then, he continues the hard work of a farmer, with the influence of SCC.

"I hope to be able to transition out of my role as the main decision maker and allow the next generation to continue to successfully manage and operate the farm into the future," he said.

Morgan Looks Back Over His Years at SCC

After a 31-year career at Southeast Community College, **Bob Morgan** has decided to retire from his position as Beatrice Campus Director/Vice President for Program Development. During that time, he started out as a business instructor at the Lincoln Campus and ended being in charge of the Beatrice Campus.

He's seen the College change and evolve over the years and finishes his career with one of the most challenging times for any college administrator. He looks back over the years at his accomplishments and what he will miss when he finally closes the door for good.

How would you sum up your career at SCC?

The one thing I will always take away is knowing that for 31 years I have been able to have a part in making students' lives better. Our mission is critical and our task, no matter what we do for SCC, impacts so many students and employers across the state of Nebraska and beyond. I look back with pride with all we have done the past 31 years, and am so blessed to have been a part of the SCC family.

What are some of the highlights during your career?

In 1998, a handful of entrepreneurial instructors made the move to put classes online. I taught the first online class (Intro to Business) with another instructor that fall. That program grew from eight students to the success it is today.

Under the encouragement and direction of President Dr. Paul Illich, I was instrumental in opening up six learning centers across our 15-county area and giving our rural constituents access to SCC.

I also helped lead the process to transform an old 1965 (Pershing)

college in Beatrice to the beginnings of a state-of-the-art educational campus. What have been some of the challenges?

Distance learning was a moving target with the number of different learning management systems we used. Those changes were hard on the faculty and the students. However, now under the direction of Virtual Learning staff, Canvas is helping SCC lead the way.

COVID-19: It was a hard year as the world went through something that most of us hope to never see again. That said, the silver lining was

to see the unsung heroes SCC has. We saw so many employees become true rock stars to help staff and students through an unprecedented year.

What will you miss most?

I will miss all of the great people I have served with over the past 31 years. We all had the purpose to help students improve their lives.

What will be your legacy?

I hope I will be remembered as a leader who was fair, and that I recognized and respected the extreme importance of every employee and every job position within the College.

What will you do in retirement?

I am sure I will enjoy my hobbies of golf and boating. However, as someone who poured 100% into



their job, there were times family did not come first. I will be spending time with my wonderful kids and awesome grandkids.

Anything else you'd like to add?

I am fortunate my mother and father were my mentors and supporters. My mom was the one who saw the (help wanted) ad in the newspaper and passed it on, encouraging me to apply (she was a K-12 teacher). My father taught me early in life that we are all important and we all put our pants on one leg at a time. If you remember that and treat people fairly, you will be successful in life.

Southeast Community College's women's and men's soccer teams held their inaugural matches on Friday, April 2, at the new soccer field on the Beatrice Campus. This is the first season for Storm soccer since it was canceled last year because of COVID-19.

"We have definitely had our share of hardships surrounding all the COVID-related changes and the effects it's had on our team/roster," said women's head coach John Hakari. "The girls have been training hard since August, and they were really looking forward to finally having an opponent."





The teams competed against Western Nebraska Community College on April 2, and Otero Junior College on April 3. The women's team lost 6-1 and 5-1, and the men's team dropped 4-1 and 6-0 matches. Both Storm coaches

"It felt good to finally get out there and see the team and roster we're working with as a staff moving forward," said men's head coach Alex Scheuler. "I think everyone is happy to get the first couple of games in the books and get in the routine of playing, instead of just training."

Storm Men's Basketball Team Makes It to Nationals

The Storm men's basketball team advanced to the National Junior College Athletic Association Division II Tournament in Danville, Illinois, April 20-24. SCC battled Des Moines Area Community College in the first round and fell 90-67 to the eventual national champions. In the consolation bracket, the Storm beat Johnson County Community College 90-81, allowing the team to reach the seventh-place game April 23 against South Suburban College. SCC lost that game 77-74. This was the Storm's third trip to the national tournament since 2008 and first time they won a game since 1983 when Dana Altman was the coach.

RESPIRATORY CARE ALUM WORKS WITH COVID-19 PATIENTS _____

When Lincoln native **Brandon Schwab** decided he wanted a career that would be both satisfying and a great service to others, he enrolled at Southeast Community College. He decided to go into Respiratory Care and has never looked back.

"The most rewarding part is seeing good patient outcomes and knowing that you played a role as a part of a team to make that happen," Schwab said. "I can't think of a more rewarding career than being a respiratory therapist."

After spending two years at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Schwab decided to transfer to SCC to find his place and receive more direction than a bigger school had to offer. He said it was the perfect fit, and he was more successful academically as well.

"SCC is a great fit for those students who enjoy smaller class sizes and greater access to their instructors," he recalled. "The school can also be a launching pad to even higher levels of education."

After graduating from the Respiratory Care program in 2002, he worked at CHI Health St. Elizabeth in Lincoln. He and his family decided to move to Orlando, Florida, in 2012. Currently, Schwab is a Level 5 Lead Respiratory Therapist working in intensive care at Orlando Regional Medical Center. Working with COVID-19 patients has been his "new normal" during the past year.

"Some days you are going non-stop for 12 hours, and others aren't so bad," he said. "The difficult part with COVID patients is taking on and off the personal protective equipment constantly. But I work with a great team, and we do our best to take care of our patients while also keeping the environment loose and fun."

He said the most challenging part of his job is the mental aspect. It can be overwhelming when you're caring for patients, talking to family members, and things aren't going well, Schwab said.

"But I always try to maintain my professionalism and do the best work that I can for my patients," he added.

Schwab's wife, Michelle, is a 1997 graduate of SCC's Respiratory Care program. She is currently helping to launch a new hospital in the Orlando area, and they both look back fondly on their time at the College.

"I would advise others to seek an education at SCC because it's a great path to a rewarding career," Brandon said. "There is such a variety of programs to choose from, whether it's in healthcare, business, law enforcement, agriculture, or any of the trades."

Schwab said he and his family moved to Florida to see a different part of the country. They enjoy the theme parks, diversity and all-around good climate. �



Dr. Courtney Bruntz is SCC's new Associate Dean of Arts & Sciences. She brings with her a wealth of higher education experience and a rich background in East Asian culture.

"I'm very excited to be at SCC and to be part of a dynamic community college," Bruntz said. "What I love about teaching is meeting each student where they are, and SCC is a remarkable institution that supports learners at all stages."

Bruntz received her bachelor's degree in Religious Studies and Speech Communications from Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois. During this time she studied abroad in Japan, China, Hong Kong, and Taiwan.

"It was this experience that sparked a love and passion for studying Chinese religions, language and cultures," she said.

After graduation, she moved to Wuhan, China, to teach English at Central China Normal University. She then moved to California where she attended the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley. She earned a master's degree in Cultural and Historical Studies of Religion, and a Ph.D. in Buddhist Studies.

Prior to SCC, she was at Doane University and established the Asian Studies program, led study abroad trips to China, and helped direct the Honors Program. She also taught at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Nebraska Wesleyan University and Oregon State University.

"I was attracted to SCC because of its commitment to students, plus the passion everyone at the College has for creating academic environments in which students thrive," she said. "I am excited to bring my enthusiasm and experience to such an excellent college."

Since Bruntz had lived in Wuhan, where the

COVID-19 strain was first detected, she knew a lockdown in our country was imminent by hearing about her friends in that region who had begun the process in February.

"My friends in China and Taiwan have, however, returned to 'normal' life, and did so by July," she said. "That also changes my perspective on things, knowing that so many



locations have been able to return back to life pre-COVID."

In her spare time, Bruntz is an avid runner and likes to experiment with vegan cooking. Her husband Michael is a sportswriter covering Nebraska football, and they have a two-year old daughter, Daphne. Her office will be located at the Lincoln Campus at 8800 O St. �

Lincoln Campus Set to Undergo Major Renovation



The Lincoln Campus is undergoing a major, \$30-million facelift that will change the look and feel of the campus. The Student and Academic Support renovation project started in March. Around 80,000 square feet of the main building will be completely renovated, while 25,672 square feet will be added.

"This project demonstrates our continued progress in addressing our space needs, from improving fire and life safety, evacuation and egress, to confidential spaces and accommodating the growth we've been experiencing on the campus," said Bev Cummins, vice president for student affairs and Lincoln Campus director. "Addressing our space needs is vital in fulfilling our mission and bringing our student and academic



support services to the central portion of the building."

Many departments are relocating while the work is being done, but Cummins said everyone is doing their part to make things as smooth and efficient as possible. The renovation project is scheduled to be completed by April 2023.

"Externally, it will provide a welcoming and transparent 'front door' that is modern, yet timeless," Cummins added. "It will be a classy, welcoming, and transparent space that will create a cohesive connection between support services and students."

FROM ELECTROMECHANICAL TO CHOCOLATE

When **Kevin Baker** enrolled in the Electromechanical program at Southeast Community College in 1972, he was one of only two students since it was a brand-new program. He's proud to be part of the introductory class.

"It changed my whole life," he said about his time at the Milford Campus. "I feel like I was prepared when I graduated. I could hold my own."

Originally from Cedar Creek, Nebraska, Baker always had an interest in mechanical equipment design. After he graduated from SCC in 1973, he first worked at Brunswick Corporation in the aerospace division. When that plant closed, he went on to work at a candy manufacturer until it closed. Since he had experience with designing massproduction candy-making equipment, he decided to start up his own candy company in 1987.

"The boys were small, so I decided to go and develop our own candy," he said. "You gotta take a gamble sometime."

The gamble proved to be worth it. Bakers Candies is one of the most





successful and well-known candy companies in Nebraska and the Midwest. The family-owned business is located in small-town Greenwood, Nebraska, but people come from near and far to get their hands on the famous chocolate meltaways in the colorful twist-wrapped foils.

The business started with four employees and now has 21, Baker said, including his sons Todd and Paul. Kevin designed the four automated production lines, which are able to mass produce candy at a rapid rate. For example, it's able to wrap 220 individual candies in one minute. He said the most rewarding part of the job is knowing it's his family's business.

"The idea that you started it, and every day you get your job done and make a living for the whole family," he said.

Todd, the oldest son, is the general manager, while Paul serves as the production manager. Both grew up in the chocolate factory and even experienced some important milestones there.

"I learned how to walk on the factory floor," Paul remembered. "After school, the school bus would drop me off here, too."

"The most rewarding part is working with family," Todd said. "The reason we love what we do is we get to work together."

He adds that working in a family business isn't for everyone. Some days there are definitely challenges. However, the key is to have boundaries.

"Each of us has our own responsibilities with the business, and we work hard to respect each other and those responsibilities," he said. "We work together, but we try not to overlap."

Kevin looks back fondly on his time at SCC Milford. He even supports a scholarship at Louisville High School for students to attend SCC.

"He's very indebted to the education he got from SCC Milford," Todd said. "SCC put the tools in his hands and enabled him to do all of this."

Bakers Candies added a new outlet store in September 2019. The Bakers now have more space to sell the famous meltaways, as well as hundreds of other types of candies and refreshments.

As for the future, the Bakers hope to keep churning out hundreds of pounds of candy each day, which equates to approximately half a million pounds per year. With nine grandchildren, there's plenty of help to be found.

"If your last name is Baker, nobody's safe," Todd joked. "They'll get recruited at some point or another." 🔹

Milford Building Construction Alum has a Hand in Church Construction

It can take several years from concept through fundraising and building. It is always very rewarding to complete the construction of a church."

"I was able to begin my career at Brown Construction as a carpenter, moving up to a foreman, superintendent, general superintendent, and now chief estimator," he said. "Being able to

He was initially attracted to SCC because of the hands-on experience he was gaining, as well as the instructors having had realworld experience in the fields they taught. He also made many lasting friendships with both students and instructors.

"I enjoyed the level of training I received in so many aspects of the construction trade, from laying brick to estimating," he recalled. "It was a well-rounded program."

Because of the onset of COVID-19. churches were changing the way services were being held, which meant many of the church construction projects were put on hold. As a result, Brown Construction branched out and took on other construction projects throughout Nebraska.

"A few of the projects we were recently awarded include the Kearney Community Tennis Facility, the Lincoln



County Jail in North Platte, and the Grant Swimming Pool."

Bishop said he plans to stay at Brown Construction until he retires, since he loves what he does and the people he works with. When he's not working, he enjoys turkey hunting and spending time with his wife of 20 years, Tricia, his daughter Ariana and his son Gavin. 🛠

Nowadays, there are more flexible class schedules to keep up with the ever-changing workforce. Newer buildings are emerging on campus to accommodate those changes.


"I watched them put walls up and take them down," she said. "All of the new construction is so important, so fabulous, because we needed it so bad."
