Larry Stauffer Memorial Scholarship

A newly established scholarship honors a former Southeast Community College faculty member. The Larry Stauffer Memorial Scholarship was recently created to memorialize the former chair of Milford's Building Construction Technology program. Stauffer was at SCC from 1968-1973.

To qualify for the scholarship, students must be:

- Full-time in the Building Construction Technology program
- · Enrolled in the second semester
- · Have a minimum cumulative 3.0 grade-point average
- · Show financial need

"Larry was always there for the students, and he was so proud of their success," said Dan Muhleisen, family friend and member of the SCC Educational Foundation Board. "It will be great to have his memory attached to this scholarship and future students."

The Stauffer family will fund one or two scholarships a year, according to Muhleisen, and add to it annually so the scholarship can continue to grow.

"Everyone that has (so far) contributed to the scholarship fund is a friend of Vance's (Larry's son), and some are former students of Larry's who are now successful contractors," Muhleisen added.

SCC Alum Named UNO Pitching Coach

Payton Kinney started his collegiate baseball career pitching for the Southeast Community College Storm and spent three years at the Beatrice Campus before a shoulder injury forced him out for a season.

Now the Norris High School graduate will be on the other side of the game. In July he was named the new pitching coach at the University of Nebraska Omaha.

While at SCC, his best memories

were not the wins or the strikeouts. but the friendships he made along the way.

"It wasn't necessarily the great games. but the teammates who you go through everything with," he said. "That's what I remember."

Kinney remembers the wins, too, and there were many when he was with the Storm from 2014-2016.

"I remember winning a lot; it seemed like all we did was win." he recalled. "We struggled at the beginning, but we had a 22-game win streak at one time."

Even though most players dream of playing collegiate baseball at the highest level, Kinney can't talk enough about the great experiences he had playing junior college ball.

"At first I wasn't sure what to expect, but it was a very high level of ball," he said. "Everyone there was so good. It's a great place to get better so you can reach the highest level."

Kinney credits the coaching staff for its tough workouts and pushing players to be their best. He said

"They work extremely hard at recruiting," he said. "As long as they're at SCC, they will be a tough opponent. I would be surprised if they didn't have a

great year next year."

Parks said Kinney always worked hard on and off the field, and always looks for ways to improve his game. He finished his SCC career with a 12-6 record and 114 strikeouts.

"Payton was always the most competitive kid on the field," Parks said. "What really caught our attention was the passion he played with. He spent countless hours working on his arm strength to gain velocity, which helped him earn a Division I scholarship."

College coaches from around the region frequently attend Storm games to watch potential recruits. Kinney earned a scholarship to play at UNO in 2016. He played for the Mavericks for another three years but was once again sidelined for a

season because of an elbow injury. He finished his senior year with a 1.96 Earned Run Average, an 11-2 record and 111 strikeouts.

He is excited about the upcoming challenge.

"Right now I want to be the best coach I can try to be; it's still so exciting and so unknown," he said. "I'm going to give it everything I've got, and I think it'll be a lot of fun."

"I think the mentality he has and the work ethic he displayed over his career will translate really well on the coaching side," Parks added. "I am excited to see how he does. We are very proud of Payton and wish him the best at Omaha."

Kinney will never forget his years playing at SCC and hopes to encourage other young players to follow their hearts with baseball. But only if they love it.

"Work your butt off and have fun doing it," he said. "If it feels like a job, do something else. I can't overemphasize how important it is to enjoy it. You'll have a fun career, and it'll be the best time of vour life."

Kinney earned an Associate of Arts degree in Academic Transfer from SCC and a bachelor's degree in Multidisciplinary Studies from UNO.

Retired Ag Instructor to Donate Original Drawings

Glen Sorensen, a retired developer of the Southeast Community College Ag program, is donating his original drawings to the Beatrice Campus. Sorensen, now 87, recounts the history

of designing and developing the SCC Beatrice Agriculture Center which, nearly 40 years later, is still in use.

The Ag program was originally on the Milford Campus, though they had no land or animals of their own. According to Sorensen, classes traveled to different farms in the area.

Sorensen was hired by SCC in September 1980 to design a state-of-theart Ag Center on the Beatrice Campus. He drew the layout for the buildings, oversaw the construction and wrote the curriculum for the classes. The first Ag classes were held in the new facility in January 1981.

Born in 1932, Sorensen was raised on a hog and dairy farm. The family fell on hard times through the Great Depression, drought and World War II. His father was killed in a tragic tractor accident on Sorensen's eighth birthday. In addition, cholera swept through their operation, killing 20 hogs that were

ready for market and causing them to lose the family farm.

Using that tragedy as inspiration, in 1965 he designed and patented a stateof-the-art swine system.

"My goal in life was to make a better sanitary system to raise hogs," Sorensen

Though that patent was never used. he used a similar version of the swine gestation building at the Beatrice Ag facility. Other buildings included five livestock confinement buildings, a feed processing facility with a classroom and an animal health facility with classroom.

"A successful health and nutrition program is the key to the success of the Ag program," he said.

He did all veterinarian work in the health facility, except caesarean sections, to keep it free from disease.

Sorensen designed a waste handling system for the center that included two lagoons. The animal waste went into the first lagoon where the liquid was then pumped into the second lagoon, leaving the sludge behind. The second lagoon then was used as an irrigation system.

Sorenson developed and taught Livestock Nutrition, Swine Production, Beef Production, Livestock Management, and Animal Health. In fall 1984 Sorensen moved to the Crop Production area of the program, teaching Irrigation and Water Management, Ag Chemicals and Safe Pesticide Use, Soil Science and Soil Testing, Agronomy, and Ag Chemical Equipment Safety and Application.

Starting the Crop Production area with no equipment, he found a used eightfoot John Deere drill for the College to purchase, which it used to plant 35 acres of oats to prepare the soil for an alfalfa

crop. He used modern techniques of the Global Positioning System for setting up the irrigation systems starting in the late 1980s.

Sorenson's students worked with him on every aspect of farming, including working with Natural Resources District officials in developing a layout for the campus watershed dam used to stop erosion and for irrigation of crops.

Sorensen recalls the Ag program at Beatrice started with just nine students, eight males and one female. When he retired in 1992, the program had grown to around 190 students with a small number of females. According to Robin Moore, Administrative Director for Institutional Effectiveness & Research, the Ag program has remained strong with enrollment numbers in the last 10 years fluctuating between 141 and a high of 220 in the 2014-2015 academic year. The percent of females also has grown. During the last decade, 19 percent of program students, on average, have been female. Females comprise 22.5 percent of the program in the current academic year.

The SCC Ag program has seen many changes over the years since Sorensen retired, including the use of drones and the option to earn a certificate in Precision Agriculture.

Sorensen's donation includes a plaque displaying a picture of the original drawings along with an aerial photo of the completed buildings. This display will hang in the building north of the current Ag center, which will be remodeled into a new Ag classroom building in the near future.

FJC Alum Finds Success as Western Fiction Author


Ronald L. "Ron" Schwab has worn many hats since graduating from Fairbury Junior College in 1961: successful attorney, mayor of Fairbury, SCC Distinguished Alumni and Board of Governors member, and beloved husband and father. Schwab can now add award-winning author to that list.

Schwab has been an avid reader with a passion for writing since childhood. By the 1980s he had penned a handful of Western fiction novels under a pseudonym. The novels were not published, and Schwab concluded he wouldn't be able to write for a living so it was time to get back to the "real world."

In 2015 Schwab's son took interest in one of the unpublished novels, believing there was a niche for the Western fiction genre. He started an independent publishing group and, serving as his father's agent and publisher, released the novels through Amazon.

The younger Schwab's instincts proved to be on point. Ron Schwab's Western fiction has been performing very well on Amazon, with combined sales of all titles currently approaching the halfmillion mark. Most of the sales come from electronic versions of the novels, which can be viewed on tablets such as Kindles.

Schwab's most successful novel to date, "Grit," topped the Amazon bestseller list in several Western categories




for two months in fall 2018. In June 2019 the Western Fictioneers professional writer's association announced that "Grit" had won the Peacemaker Award for Best Western Novel of 2018.

Three years ago, Schwab retired from his law practice to devote more time to writing. He's currently contracted though Amazon to release four novels a year. Schwab and his wife, Bev, maintain a residence in their home town of Fairbury but now spend a majority of their time at their Flint Hills, Kansas cabin where Ron does most of his writing.

Multidisciplinary Learning Center

May 7, 2019, marked the next step in an overhaul of the SCC Beatrice Campus as ground was broken marking the official start to constructing a \$19 million Multidisciplinary Learning Center.

The 52,000 square-foot facility will provide much-needed classroom and lab space to support several areas of study: Academic Transfer offerings (including labs for Biology, Chemistry, and Physics); Agriculture; Business; Criminal Justice; and Nursing.

The structure is the first modern general-purpose classroom building on the Beatrice Campus. In addition to classroom space, the learning center design includes flexible space for Continuing Education classes, community events and meetings. Estimated completion date for the project is August 2020.




"I not only had him as an instructor, but he actually took the time to sit down with me and ask me what my goals were for school, etc.," Ferris said. "I found with the smaller classes

Karen Hermsen Retires From a Long Educational Career

My first teaching assignment was a one-year sabbatical teaching at Wahoo Neumann. I was then hired as department head at York High School, where I sponsored the pep club and started an FBLA chapter, Cooperative Education program, and served on an advisory committee for two years. Then my husband was accepted into medical school in Omaha. For the three years he was in medical school, I taught at Omaha Holy Name serving as chairperson of the business department.

After he graduated from medical school and was completing his Family Practice Residency in Omaha, I stayed home with our children and typed medical textbooks.

In 1982, we moved to Beatrice where my husband started his medical practice. Doris Buttell, a friend who was teaching at SCC, asked if I would instruct a Continuing Education class that she had been teaching because she was going to start teaching full time.

My career started at SCC on the Beatrice Campus the summer of 1984. I taught Continuing Education courses in the evening. In January 1986, the Office Technology program, as it was referred to then, asked if I would be interested in teaching part-time daytime classes. Since this fit well with our children's school schedule, I jumped at the opportunity. In November 1990, I was reclassified as full time and continued to teach on the Beatrice Campus through December 1999.

In January 2000, I transferred to the Lincoln Campus in the Office Technology program, which is now renamed Office Professional. In January 2005, I became co-chair with JoAnn Frazell and continued in that role until her retirement in 2006. I have been program chair since that time.

I have enjoyed being with students, whether it was working with them to do their best in classes, listening to them, or advising them toward graduation. Even if you teach the same classes every term, the students are different. The past few years I have returned to teach in the classroom, in addition to online classes, and I really took pleasure in getting to know the students better. Online teaching can be difficult making a real connection with students.

I also liked learning new technology as it is constantly changing in our program, and I experienced many changes throughout the years that allowed me to stay current. My first teaching assignment the students used Selectric typewriters. Later at SCC we used the Displaywriter, which was a dedicated word processor to our current PCs today.

As the Cooperative Experience Coordinator, I have enjoyed seeing the students work in the "real" world and



utilize the skills they were taught at SCC. Working with the outside supervisors have helped me understand the skills that are needed in the business world today and prepare them to be "business ready," as well as allowing me to make many networking connections.

This summer we watched our six grandchildren's athletic activities and continue to travel. My husband, who is now also retired, and I plan to get more involved with our church and community through volunteer activities.



"Late Dec. 26, 2004: A catastrophic 9.3 earthquake and tsunami devastated the lives, property and economic sustainability of many countries in the Asia pacific. The natural disaster in Aceh, Indonesia, was devastating beyond imagination. Almost 300,000 lives vanished in the floods, with more than 500,000 displaced in communities. This traumatic event in Aceh was a crossroads in my high-flying corporate lifestyle. I packed my 40-pound backpack to serve the disaster region in Aceh, and that was followed by another devastating earthquake emergency crisis response (EPC) in Jogjakarta, Indonesia. Afterwards, I was assigned as a technical project advisor overseeing the design of a new hospital and higher education institution project in war-torn Kabul, Afghanistan.

I am currently serving in Iraq as a senior shelter engineer and head of the technical engineering department. I manage multiple emergency and post-emergency reconstruction projects throughout Iraq from Mosul to Baghdad. Some of my achievements in humanitarian work is illustrated under Career Achievements in **UN Humanitarian Work International**

Over the years while working for the United Nations, I further enriched my scholastic and humanitarian

achievements by pursuing post-graduate certification in disaster management. I have contributed to engineering and construction practices at an international humanitarian organization post in Indonesia, Nepal, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, and Iraq. Since 2014, humanitarian response mission work in Iraq was very challenging, specifically drawing much attention around the world as ISIS terrorists were controlling the neighboring region very close to our mission work while we built many internal displaced people camps for victims of terror and war.

Finally, my passion remains intact serving humanity representing the United Nations program. Upon retirement from the U.N., I will continue disseminating my skills and expertise in education with academic institutions and government agencies by sharing my knowledge, skills and experiences in humanitarian disaster risk management and response practices."
