Maureen Gobel Receives Nebraska Community College Association Distinguished Alumni Award

"I'm very grateful for this award," Gobel told the audience. "I guess I thought that once I had retired, people would forget about me." Even with a bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and a master's from Arizona State University, it was the education she received at Fairbury Junior College that had a major impact on her life.

"I came to realize that I had as good of instructors at Fairbury Junior College as I did at my four-year colleges," Gobel said. Maureen retired from SCC on May 6, 2004, after a 42-year career in education. She described her teaching career at SCC-Beatrice, FJC and Fairbury High School as "a terrific roller-coaster ride of chills, fears, excitement, personal satisfaction, and just plain gratitude for survival, giving me tremendous memories of students and colleagues that I expect to savor for the rest of my life."

She joined the business faculty of SCC in 1978, teaching in the secretarial program (now Office Professional) and teaching at night for continuing education. Malchow served on the state board of directors for PBL for 15 years and has been a Beatrice chapter advisor since it was formed in 1982. Asked for a special memory, Malchow said she has a real fondness for PBL. "So many students

Douglass started his SCC teaching career in 1977 and probably has a picture of every student who went through the Ag program while he was teaching. He wanted his students to learn and succeed and realize that they are in charge of what they become. When asked how he felt about the snowy driving conditions of his former co-workers after the Fall Quarter was completed, he said, "Yup, I think about you guys, snow, whiteout, then I just roll over and take another nap."

Instructor Changed Student's Life

"My years at Fairbury Junior College (1980-82) were something special, and I will always remember them fondly. The instructors and the students were all comfortable with each other and respected each other, or so it seemed. I remember one business instructor named Ken Walkington. He had been around (retired Navy officer), and was a master at explaining how a lot of 'big pictures' got broken into a lot of 'little pictures'. I know he changed my life for the better.

"After my FJC education, I went on to get my B.S. degree from Oregon State University. I then got into banking and worked my way up from being a repo man to becoming a bank president by age 35. I also have been a small business owner for the last 10 years in Oregon and Nevada, and I am currently a real estate broker in Portland, Ore.

"My second year I was elected president of the student body after a half-dozen of us students all made speeches in the cafeteria one day. We started a local radio show that was on once a week, and we really worked hard to raise the profile and value of the school in the community that year. That delay (in closing the Fairbury campus) gave at least a few hundred more students (mostly all in-state) an opportunity for the special life-changing experience the campus offered."

Condolences

George Johnson, former instructor at Fairbury Junior College, died Jan. 11, 2010. Johnson had been associated with FJC and SCC for most of his adult life. He graduated from FJC in 1949, where he was a charter member of Phi Theta Kappa and student body president. He transferred to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in agriculture, graduating with high distinction in 1951. After graduating from UNL, Johnson served in the Marine Corps until 1953. He began teaching agriculture at FJC in 1954. In 1961, he switched to teaching biology and was presented a National Science Foundation award to complete his second degree. He graduated from the University of Colorado with a master's degree in biology in 1963. He resumed his teaching career at FJC and stayed with the school when it became part of the Southeast Community College system in 1972. While he was with SCC, Johnson led a veterans' agriculture program that offered classes to farmers who had been in military service. Johnson retired from teaching in May 1985 after being elected a Jefferson County commissioner.

Charlie Barringer recalled, "Every year the faculty and staff at Fairbury had a Christmas party, and George dressed up as Santa to hand out the gifts. Well, George fit the suit from the Elks Club, and he also had the right laugh. This continued for a long time until the year we decided to 'roast' Santa."

Meet the Eisenhauers

Patricia J. Patterson met **Phillip Eisenhauer** at the second-semester party to welcome new students. (Of the three new students, they were the only two that had arrived.) Pat transferred from Hastings College and moved in with her grandmother to finish the second year, graduating in 1951. Does anyone remember Churnside's ice cream parlor where Pat worked for three summers?

Phil says he spent five years getting through FJC! (Class of 1951) "Not entirely academically deficient! Attend a semester, drop out, work awhile, and come back. (Faculty and administration "cooperated" in allowing my in-and-out schedule.) I entered with returning vets; they had lots of experience to share!!!"

He matriculated to Hastings College following graduation from FJC, was married that summer, and worked in Yosemite, Calif. Then, with Pat teaching, Phil went straight through, earning a B.A. in history. The couple then moved to St. Louis, Mo., where Phil entered Eden Theological Seminary. He earned a Master of Divinity in 1956 and was then ordained in the United Church of Christ. He served four congregations during his professional career: Bellevue, Wash.; Cheney, Wash.; Great Falls, Mont., and finally, Magnolia Church in Seattle, Wash. He completed the doctoral dissertation in 1972, earning a doctorate in ministry from Eden.

Pat went on to graduate from Eastern Washington University at age 40. Her career continued in education with home-bound children. In Seattle, she continued to work with programs for the gifted, eventually becoming the district curriculum consultant for gifted programs for about 10 years. She spent the last five years teaching bilingual students who were integrated with neighborhood children.

"There were 12 different languages spoken in the homes of my students (there were 39 languages of children in the school), and those languages varied from year to year," Pat said. "What a fun job! I learned so much from the kids."

"Since retirement 17 years ago, we have been able to travel the world, at 79 and 80, we are still planning trips," Pat said. "It's a fabulous world. We have also had many refugees from around the world live with us."

Federal Job Result of Speaker in Classroom

Roy Singleton made a career decision at Fairbury Junior College because an instructor invited a speaker to his class. That decision kept him active in the field even beyond retirement. "Mr. Drexler had someone from the government stop by to talk about jobs in government. I sent in my application and got a summer job as a student trainee with the Bureau of Reclamation in St. Paul, Neb. I went to UNL after Fairbury and received a B.S. and M.S. in engineering. After I married but was still in college, I transferred to the soil conservation in Lincoln. Finally, upon graduation, I went to work for the Corps of Engineers since I had my foot in the door as a government employee."

He remains active in the engineering field through a mentoring program at the University of Nebraska-Omaha. "A professional group I belong to, the Society of American Military Engineers, had just started a program to introduce secondary school students to engineering and architecture because we are not graduating enough engineers/architects in this country.

The program became so successful that the Society could no longer manage it using volunteers, and they asked me to be the administrator. The Peter Kiewit Institute at UNO saw this program as a win-win situation because the program works with pre-college students and utilizes mentors from local professional firms who would then hire these students. Trained, Ready to Respond

Firefighter and paramedic **Fred Benzel** was recently recognized for assisting in CPR at St. Francis Medical Center to help a fellow firefighter who collapsed while in town for the Nebraska State Fire School. The firefighter survived and is still a member of the Meadow Grove Fire Department.

Fred Benzel headed to St. Francis Medical Center last May intending to support the friends of a Meadow Grove firefighter who had collapsed at a Grand Island restaurant. He ended up helping save Adam Wright's life.

Benzel, 27, and fellow firefighter Mark Bonser, both members of the Nebraska Serious Injury and Line of Duty Death Response Team, moved between the room where Wright was being treated and his friends who gathered at the hospital. The hospital was busy that night with several critical patients, and the staff was overwhelmed. A couple of times while Benzel and Bonser were in the room, Wright coded so they pitched in with CPR.

Fred was instrumental in saving this kid's life," Bonser said. "Fred's a great guy. I think he deserves a little recognition." During the recent annual meeting of the Nebraska Serious Injury and Line of Duty Death Response Team, Benzel was honored for his actions. It is the first such award to be given by the team, formed in 2006. Bonser said. "I was very taken back," Benzel said. "I was just there to help, not to win an award."

Grand Island Fire Chief Troy Hughes also speaks highly of Benzel. "He's a newer member, but he's aggressive and he wants to learn new things," Hughes said. "He's become a (hazardous material) tech and he's involved in the community, which sets a positive example." He said Benzel's actions at St. Francis that May evening were a great asset to Wright's friends and family as well as the hospital staff. "His being there for the family meant a lot," Hughes said. "They appreciated it. He acted as a community liaison and linked them to other resources."

2003 Alumna Leads Independent Life Despite Lifelong Diseases

Shelby Stubbendick could justify wearing a button that says "Why me?" Since the day she was born she has dealt with two diseases that have made her life challenging to say the least. Still, Stubbendick, a 2003 Office Technology (now Office Professional) graduate, has a quick smile and a positive attitude.

"Sometimes I feel like 'why me', but I believe God only gives you what you can handle," said Stubbendick, 28.

Diagnosed at age 3, Stubbendick has fibrous dysplasia, a bone disease that replaces normal bone with fibrous bone tissue, and McCune-Albright Syndrome, a genetic disease that affects the bones, pigmentation of the skin and growth hormones. The fibrous dysplasia has left Stubbendick short in stature.



At age 1, Stubbendick suffered a broken arm, the first of approximately 20 fractures that have included her arms, legs and back. She's undergone surgeries on her legs at Shriner's Hospital in Minneapolis. Her most recent hospitalization occurred in December 2009 when a rod that had been in her right femur 17 years began to cause problems and was removed. If left in her leg, an infection could have developed.

Despite her physical challenges, the youngest child of Ron and Sandy Stubbendick of Waverly earned an associate's degree from SCC, lives independently and has held a part-time job at the Cabela's call center in Lincoln since May 2008.

Interested in both the medical field and computers, Stubbendick combined the two areas by taking SCC's Office Technology program with a Medical Office focus. After taking full-time hours at SCC her first quarter, she went part-time the rest of the way, all the while working in the drive-thru at the McDonald's at 27th and Superior.

"The staff at SCC was very accommodating," Stubbendick said. "In some computer classrooms I had a tote that I could put my feet on. And I also used a backpack on wheels while taking classes."

After SCC, Stubbendick applied for 110 jobs, received seven interviews and one job offer. "It was quite frustrating," she said. "I had one interview with a small business, and the only ques-

"It was quite frustrating," she said. "I had one interview with a small business, and the only question asked me was what my plans were for Thanksgiving."

In December 2003, Stubbendick was hired full-time as a tele-recruiter at the Community Blood Bank at 84th and O St. In June 2006, she took a job at Technical Management Inc., which later was acquired by Perot Systems Corp. She left that job in November 2007.

Stubbendick said she has experienced job discrimination. She said when she first began looking for work, she'd tell prospective employers about her education and her different work experiences.

"I just tried to sell myself," she said. "But you get a vibe at the beginning of the interview." Stubbendick said she lives a relatively normal life with her dog Oreo. She's lived in her current

home nearly seven years. She drives, thanks to pedal extensions, and she's had a scooter for about three years. Still, she gets a few stares when she's out in public.

Stubbendick has her moments when she doesn't look at the world through rose-colored glasses. But those days are few and far between. And she's content with her job at Cabela's call center. However, Stubbendick said one day she'd like to use more of the skills she acquired from SCC. "I always wanted to be a nurse," she said. "So I went for the medical office technology instead. It would be fun to work in a hospital someday."

At 9:45 p m. on May 4, 2007, the lives of the approximately 1,600 residents of Greensburg, Kan., changed forever when the tornado. estimated to be 1.7 miles wide, did its

best to wipe the town off the map. An estimated 95 percent of Greensburg was destroyed. The other 5 percent was severely damaged.

Among the businesses destroyed was Sarber's employer, Kiowa County Memorial Hospital, where she had worked in the X-ray department five years.

In February 2010, Sarber and her fellow employees will begin work in the new Kiowa County Memorial Hospital. Construction on the new facility began in early 2009. It's a far cry from the somewhat primitive facility the hospital was forced to use in the aftermath of the tornado.
