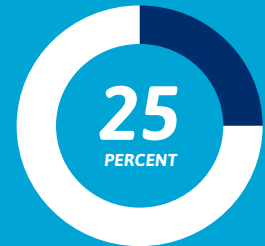

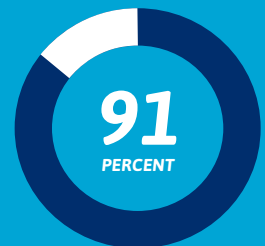

SENCAP Coordinators

SENCAP Coordinators are your point of contact for the dual credit journey. They regularly serve and visit all high schools and programs in SCC's 15-county region.

SENCAP Coordinators meet with students to provide ongoing, individualized support designed to help students successfully transition to their next step after graduation.

SENCAP Coordinators will

- assist with the SENCAP application
- facilitate registering for classes
- assist in advising of courses in which to enroll
- support with applying for graduation for SCC certificates and diplomas
- assist with orienting students to SCC online resources, including Self-Services (online drop/add), The Hub, CANVAS, etc.
- collaborate and communicate with high school faculty, counselors and administration to increase dual enrollment and the number of students who transition to SCC.
- accompany students to Discovery Days & Career Days
- support student efforts to make certain the college course requirements and dual-credit requirements are met
- facilitate career education opportunities and transitional education support for students from high school to college/coursework
- assist students/high school personnel with weekly grade updates to support students' success in SENCAP courses
- provide interpretation support of placement and career assessments to assist students in identifying career interests, goals, academic preparedness, skills, and talents

- assist with onboarding, professional development of SENCAP instructors
- support instructors for submitting rosters, midterm and final grades
- oversee SENCAP Faculty observations and course shells
- ensure quality and rigor of instructional delivery
- recruitment for new instructors

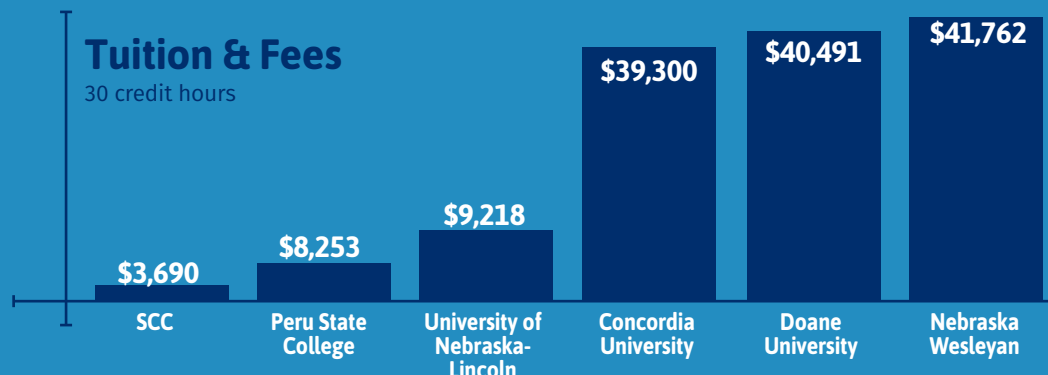

SENCAP Student Expectations and Outcomes

We expect students to earn their high school diploma and have fun exploring their career pathway.

Benefits include:

- earning college credits while still in high school
- scholarship to help cover some tuition/fees
- learning key skills in the career pathway
- learning career-readiness skills
- being ready for immediate employment with the enhanced skills they've developed
- earning a recognized certification or be well on the way to completing one
- being eligible for entry into a community college training or degree program

What is the optional Student Portfolio?

In addition to the college credit courses, students may enroll in an online student portfolio. They will access SCC's online CANVAS to complete weekly assignments. The assignments will provide students an opportunity to explore a variety of careers in their pathway.

Typical portfolio assignments include:

Career Search

Students will research career interests, identify job growth, salary, education requirements, and consider what foundational/soft skills are necessary to be successful in the career.

Field Trip Reflections, Career Days, Discovery Days

Field trips are career oriented and usually involve going to a worksite. Instructors are encouraged to suggest field trip companies/sites to their SENCAP coordinator, helping make the connection from class to academy to career.

Career and Discovery Days are a great opportunity for students to connect the full process from education to career.

Job Shadows

Students are required to complete a minimum of two job shadows a year. Job shadowing provides students a great opportunity to see the occupation in real life and ask questions of the individuals in that career path.

Scholarships

Students will research local and national scholarships.

Résumé & Cover Letter Building, References

Students will create a traditional résumé and obtain personal references. Second-year SENCAP students will transform their résumés into conversational résumés, obtain references and letters of recommendation.

Social Media

Students will gain an understanding of how social media can work to their professional benefit and how long-lasting a digital footprint can be: Twitter, Blogging, LinkedIn, etc.

Reasonable Accommodations Resource Office

Students who are involved with the Individualized Education Program (IEP) at their high school need to apply at SCC for accommodations for their college classes.

The Accommodations Resource Office (ARO) helps students set up accommodations while enrolled in classes at Southeast Community College.

It is important to note that a High School IEP or 504 plan does not apply to the College classes that a student takes at SCC through the SENCAP program.

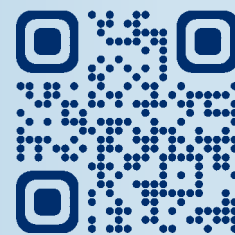

SCC Core Requirements

Every program of study requires students to build a foundation of **General Education Learning Outcomes** (GELOs) through courses in the SCC Core as well as required program classes.

To complete an associate degree, students must successfully complete a minimum of 15 semester credits from the SCC Core. Because program requirements vary, students should contact their college or faculty advisor to assist with the selection of Core courses which will meet their program's graduation requirements.

Transfer students should work closely with an advisor and the school to which they plan to transfer to make the most appropriate selections based on degree goals.

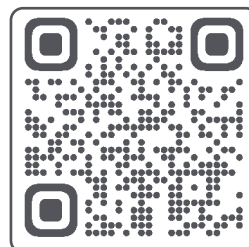

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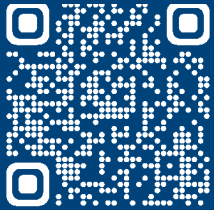

High-stakes exam taken once to possibly receive college credit.
*Must score a 3 out of 5 to be considered for college credit.

PASS RATE
