


#### **OVERVIEW**

SCC is a comprehensive community college that provides dual credit, academic transfer, and career/technical programs




### PRELIMINARY FALL 2022 <u>ENROLLMENT</u>: ESTIMATING A 1% INCREASE FROM FALL 2021

#### **Enrollment Trend**


Trend of number and distribution of enrolled students with ability to customize the metric displayed.












# Several key factors were used to determine the specific learning center locations







#### PROPOSED COMMUNITY COLLEGE FUNDING MODEL

#### **LB 243**

- Maintain 2-cent levy authority for capital expenditures
- Replace general fund levy authority with Community College Future Fund (CCFF)
- CCFF baseline will be equal to the amount levied in 2023-24, or the amount generated by 7.5-cent levy rate, whichever is greater
- Budget in 2024-25 would be baseline plus 3.5% or percentage increase in Reimbursable Educational Units, whichever is greater
- Could levy a general fund tax rate to fund the CCFF or State Aid if necessary
- Taxpayers can receive 100% tax credit for transition year before removal of general fund taxing authority





### ASSUMPTIONS FOR MODEL COMPARISON: CURRENT VS PROPOSED (RETAIN CURRENT LEVY RATE AT 7.37 CENTS)




#### Current Model

- Retain current levy rate of 7.37 cents for FY2024
- 0.2 cent increase in levy for FY2027, FY2031, FY2035
- 15% valuation increase for FY2024
- Subsequent valuation increases of5.3% annually
- 2% increase in state dollars annually

#### Proposed Model

- Retain current levy rate of 7.37 cents for FY2024
- 15% valuation increase for FY2024
- Subsequent CCFF increases of 3.5% annually
- 2% increase in state dollars annually

### Difference in Annual and Cumulative Revenue Compared to Current Model Retain current levy rate at 7.37




#### Additional assumption:

### ROLE OF 100% TAX CREDIT IN TRANSITIONING TO NEW FUNDING MODEL



 Beginning 2024-25, the new funding model replaces general fund tax dollars with the Community College Future Fund (CCFF), which will be set based on the amount the community colleges levy in 2023-24.

- Because this dynamic transition process could lead to the utilization of any remaining fund authority, the bill includes a
  - 100% tax credit for the taxes paid based on the rate set in 2023-24 and beyond.

### ROLE OF 100% TAX CREDIT IN TRANSITIONING TO NEW FUNDING MODEL



#### 2023 Income Tax Returns (filed in 2024)

Taxpayers can receive a tax credit estimated to be around 50% of 2022 community college property tax paid in 2023. The amount paid was based on the levy rate set by the College in Sep. 2022. (Resulting from the passage of LB 243 in 2023)

#### 2024 Income Tax Returns (filed in 2025)

Taxpayers can receive a tax credit equal to **100%** of 2023 community college property tax paid in 2024. The amount paid will be based on the levy rate set by the College in Sep. 2023. (Resulting from the passage of LB 243 in 2023)
