# SCC's Headrick, Feit Win Awards at NCCA Conference

**Dr. Dennis Headrick**, vice president for instruction at Southeast Community College, and **Robert Feit**, a member of SCC's Board of Governors, received awards from the Nebraska Community College Association during its annual meeting in Lincoln.



Headrick was presented the 2019 NCCA Administrator's Award, while Feit was presented the 2019 NCCA Governor's Award. The ceremony and dinner were held Nov. 3 in Lincoln.

Headrick has served SCC for the past 29 years, including Beatrice Campus director. He has served on many state and national boards in various leadership roles and has been instrumental in many transformative changes at SCC, including his role in converting the College from quarters to semesters.

"Dr. Headrick is an outstanding community college administrator who has served SCC with integrity and dedication to the needs of diverse students and communities we serve," said President Dr. Paul Illich.



Feit, currently vice chairperson for the SCC Board, has served on the BOG for 20 years as chair, vice chair, secretary, and treasurer. "Mr. Feit deeply believes in the mission and role of the community college and has dedicated much of his time, energy and passion to promoting and supporting SCC," Illich said. # **Groundbreaking for New Building in Beatrice**

A new 52,000 square-foot building will be the next addition to the Beatrice Campus. A groundbreaking ceremony for the new classroom building was held Tuesday, May 7, 2019.

The \$19 million interdisciplinary center will include classrooms, health and science labs, as well as a multi-functional room that can be used for many purposes. Hausmann Construction is building the facility, and it's designed by BVH Architecture and Gould Evans.

"This will be an awesome upgrade for our campus and for the region," said Bob Morgan, vice president for program development and campus director. "It will provide a high-tech classroom environment that will enhance our educational and growth opportunities. It also will provide a learning and conference area for local businesses to use for training opportunities."

Beatrice Mayor Stan Wirth said the students who will be learning in the new structure will become part of the skilled workforce.

"This is a great day for Southeast Community College and the community of Beatrice," Wirth said during the groundbreaking. "When I came to Beatrice in 1971, the building over my shoulder

(Hoover Hall) was six years old, and I thought it was a state-of-the-art facility." Hoover was razed as part of SCC's facilities master plan. "I look forward to the continued transformation of the future."

Students from Health, Arts and Sciences, Business, and Criminal Justice programs will utilize the various classrooms. Construction will be complete by August 2020 and in time for the Fall Semester.

# **Instructor and Coach Bill Campbell Retires After** 32 Years of Service



Bill Campbell, Social Science instructor and men's golf coach, retired in August 2019 after 32 years of service to SCC's Beatrice Campus.

Campbell began teaching and coaching at SCC

Beatrice in 1985, heading the women's volleyball and basketball programs and men's golf. Highlights of his coaching career include 224 career victories in volleyball, a 40-10 record in volleyball in 1991, being chosen coach of the year in women's basketball in 1989, 1991 and 1993, all while competing at the National Junior College Athletic Association Division I level.

Coach Campbell's men's golf teams had significant success, with 19 team trips to the National Tournament, including 14 consecutive appearances, and a number of top-10 finishes.

A lifetime of friendships and interaction with the character, ability and personalities of many athletes has given Campbell the most pleasure. "I enjoyed working with young adults, and my goal has been to help my players achieve at the highest level possible in the sport of golf and in life," Campbell said.





# **Lincoln Graduate Turns Business Owner**

Growing up, Craig Cihal wasn't planning on owning his own motorcycle shop, but he's happy that's where life has taken him.

Originally, Cihal had been thinking about a career in computer programming, but after taking some computer classes in high school, he quickly realized it wouldn't be a good fit.

"While I was in the guidance counselor's office I noticed a Motorcycle Technology tab in an SCC three-ring binder and thought that sounded like a good deal," Cihal said.

Cihal enjoyed his time at SCC and said instructors Ken Jefferson. Al Goslee and Mick Hutchison are among his fondest memories.

"They were all so personable and really worked on a one-on-one basis," he said. "It made me feel like they were truly concerned about my education."

After graduating from the Motorcycle, ATV & Personal Watercraft Technology program in 1984, Cihal didn't immediately put his degree to work. He headed to Valmont Industries for production work. The pay was great, but that did not necessarily equal job

satisfaction. Cihal bounced around doing more factory work before moving on to help a friend in an autobody shop.

Eventually, Tim Mazour, a former SCC classmate, contacted Cihal and offered him a job at Hastings Honda. Although he wasn't planning to leave his home area of Wahoo. Cihal was convinced to move after visiting the facility. During the 11 years he spent as service manager/ shop foreman at Hastings Honda, he attended many Factory Honda Service Schools and became a Registered Honda Pro Technician. After retiring from Honda,

Cihal began working for Harley Davidson Central in Grand Island. Over the next 20 years he attended numerous service schools and

achieved the highest level of recognition, Level 5 Master Technician.

In 2016. Craig headed back to Hastings and opened his own business. C Squared Motorcycles. The entire experience has been verv rewarding. He is


responsible for all aspects of the issues, but he must also collect for the work performed, handle all building maintenance and janitorial duties, and everything in between.

The most rewarding piece of this adventure is that he is working with his passion, motorcycles.

## Why did you decide to attend Southeast **Community College?**

I had been managing an armored car company for seven years and wanted a change, something where I was the boss without the responsibility. I chose truck driving because all my life I have been driving something, and I wanted a career where I was dependent on myself and not others. I chose SCC because of the reviews and they were close to home. It also helped that it was affordable.

#### What do you remember most about your time at SCC?

When I was in class I remember how calm my instructor, Mike Kuebler, was even when he had reasons not to be. #### Where did your career take vou after your graduation from SCC?

I started with an over-theroad company which took me all over the map. Two years with them, and due to family health issues. I came home and did home health care for about a year. I also worked part-time for SCC for about a year. When that situation got better I took an in-town job with Chestermans Coca-Cola while still working part time at SCC. That also was a good job, but when SCC called me for a possible full-time position, I had to jump on it because I knew it would be a very fulfilling job. Occasionally, I

drive on the weekends to keep behind the wheel, and I am very happy with how my career is going.

#### You've held different types of jobs after graduating from your program. Talk about that.

There are so many opportunities in the truck driving field, but to start out I wanted to go over-the-road. It was a release for me from all the responsibilities of my previous job. I got to see so many beautiful places and some pretty scary ones, too. Both opened my eyes a little more to the world we live in, and I truly enjoyed it. While over the road, I had the challenge of a new place every day and a dock I had to conquer, or a conversation with a person I had just met from someplace I had never been. I drove a bit in a local setting, which also was a good job, but

I would prefer over the road if I was to go back to driving full-time. Although I teach truck driving now, I work part-time shagging trailers, which is a challenge at busy times to move trailers in such a time-sensitive way without damaging anything. It keeps my skills sharp.

When I was invited to work for SCC, I wondered if I could be secure enough in myself to do the job students would need me to do. But now I enjoy it so much and learn new things about myself and even from the students every day. I really do enjoy teaching people about something I am excited about, and I plan on staying as long as SCC will have me.

## Now that you are back at SCC helping others to get their CDL, what have you found most rewarding?

What I think is most rewarding is the feedback I get from my students knowing that I am doing a good job teaching them to be successful truck drivers. The drivers that stay in contact and share their experiences with me help me to be a better teacher. I love the 'ah-ha' moments, too.

#### What do you see in your future?

My future will be in trucking. I hope that SCC will keep me till I retire. If that is not in the cards, I will go back over the road.

## What would you tell others who are pursuing their CDL and hoping to join the trucking industry?

I would tell them to come on in. The trucking industry has so many different positions within it, and no matter where you go there are trucks delivering something somewhere. You can stay close to home or spread your wings and travel around the country.

## Milford Diesel Graduate Finishes Fourth at National Contest

**Jason Biers** is among the top Freightliner technicians in the nation after taking part in a national competition. The 1992 SCC Diesel Technology graduate took part in the 2019 Daimler Trucks North America Technician Skills Competition in August. He finished second in the regional competition in Cleveland, North Carolina, and fourth in the national competition in Portland, Oregon.

"The finals included hands-on stations and a written exam," Biers explained. "I feel the hardest part of the competition was making it through the first two-hour online exam."

Biers said more than 900 expert certified technicians in the United States and Canada took the online exam, and only the top 32 made it to the regionals. Of those technicians, only the top six advanced to the national competition.

"It was a very fun experience, meeting top techs from all over the country," he said. "I enjoyed the competition, testing myself against the best in the industry. I feel the competition made me a better tech, honing my skills to better myself."

Biers currently works at Floyd's Truck Center in Rapid City, South Dakota. He's worked there for the past 22 years. It was previously named Eddie's Truck Center.

"My time at Southeast Community College gave me a great foundation to start my career as a diesel mechanic. I learned all the fundamentals, from mechanical to electrical. to develop as a technician much faster than would have been possible through on-the-job training."

For his trip to nationals, all the expenses were paid for

Biers, his wife Andrea and his service manager, Pat Gillespie, another SCC alumnus. Biers won \$4,000 in cash and \$2.000 in prizes.

"The whole experience was awesome," he added. "Daimler went all out with

events, including tours of the factories in Portland where Western Star trucks are built, the Cleveland plant where Freightliner trucks are built, and the Penske motor sports facility that builds the race cars and so much more."

## Milford Alum Receives Master **Service Technician Status**

Mark Lamb, a 2011 graduate of Milford's Automotive Technology program, was awarded the designation of World Class Technician. Lamb is a Master Service Technician at Tom Dinsdale Automotive in Grand Island.

Service technicians can earn this status by completing the requirements for either the mechanical or body areas of expertise, along with achieving the Master Technician Certification in the required service areas.

A Master Service Technician has earned all eight certifications offered through the Automotive Service Excellence (ACE), including engine repair, automatic transmissions, manual drive trains, suspension and steering systems, brakes, electrical systems and heating and air conditioning. Passing of the recertification exam is required every five years to maintain the status.

Out of the 15 World Class Technicians in the state, another SCC alumnus, Jerry Klein, has also achieved this designation.

# **Ways to invest**

# **Cash Gift or Pledge**

The most popular way to give is an immediate cash gift or a pledge paid over time.

#### **Endowments**

A perpetual resource because the principle remains intact, and investment income is used to provide financial awards to students. A new endowment in your name or someone else's requires a minimum gift of \$5,000.

# Bequests by Will or Living Trust Distribution

Donors may specify a gift of cash, stocks, bonds, real estate, or personal property or give a percentage of their estate or the residual of the estate after gift bequests to family members.

# Retirement Savings or Insurance Beneficiary

To name the Foundation as one of the beneficiaries of retirement funds, the donor should make arrangements through the retirement fund's administrator. Other ways to give include naming the Foundation a beneficiary of an insurance policy, assigning annual dividends, or donating a paid-up policy.

### **Real Estate**

Gifts of real estate, whether private, commercial or agricultural, may be given to the Foundation.

# **Stocks, Bonds, Securities**

Appreciated assets held for more than one year may be transferred to the Foundation and deducted at fair market value, up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income, without incurring a capital gains tax.

# **Equipment and Other Property**

The Foundation can accept equipment or other personal property that may be used by the College or may be easily converted to a liquid asset.

# **Matching Gifts**

Some employers match charitable donations given by their employees to qualified nonprofit organizations like the Foundation.

#### **Charitable Gift Annuities**

A donor can transfer gifts of cash, real estate, or appreciated securities worth \$10,000 or more to the Foundation to fund an annuity agreement leading to lifetime income.

### **Charitable Remainder Unitrusts**

With a gift of \$50,000 or more, donors can establish a trust, ensure a lifetime income for themselves, and support SCC! As the value of the trust increases, so does the donor income.

## **Charitable Lead Trusts**

The Charitable Lead Trust allows a donor to establish a trust for a specific length of time, assign interest income to the Foundation, and later reclaim the asset for the donor or the beneficiary.

# **Commodities Gift Program**

This is for producers who wish to gift a quantity of produce such as corn, beans, wheat, etc. to the Foundation.

# **Learn to Dream Year 2 Added**

Students who receive the Learn to Dream Scholarship at Southeast Community College can complete a second year of credits without having to pay tuition and fees, thanks to a gift from the Acklie Charitable Foundation.

The scholarship, first established in 2007 as a partnership between Union Bank & Trust, Nelnet, Lincoln Public Schools, and SCC, included recruitment and transition support and covered tuition and fees up to 30 semester credit hours for qualifying students. The donation by ACF will now allow students to complete up to 60 quarter credit hours, or two years of study, without paying tuition and fees.

"Acklie Charitable Foundation is pleased to be able to extend the impact of the Learn to Dream Scholarship," said Halley Acklie Kruse, vice president and general counsel for the ACF. "Union Bank and Nelnet's vision to help give young people in Lincoln the opportunity to further their education is inspiring, and that is a dream we want to help continue."

Dr. Paul Illich, SCC president, said the investment by all four entities greatly assists the College in its commitment to "an open-access mission of providing a skilled workforce and affordable access to higher education for the diverse communities it serves."

"The generosity and vision of Union Bank & Trust, Nelnet, Lincoln Public Schools, and the Acklie Charitable Foundation provides opportunity and hope to future students without a clear path to earn a college degree and leverage the many life-changing benefits," Illich said. "SCC is honored and greatly appreciative of the newest member of the Learn to Dream Scholarship partnership, Acklie Charitable Foundation."

There are a number of eligibility criteria to receive the scholarship, including:

- Students must be enrolled in Lincoln Public Schools or a private school at the beginning of his or her senior year and remain in the district until graduation.
- Qualifying students who graduate from a LPS or private high school in Lincoln after Jan. 1, 2018, can take advantage of the 60 semester credit hours.
- They must be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- They must complete the 60 semester credit hours within 48 months of first enrolling at SCC.
- They must maintain a minimum cumulative 2.0 grade-point average while enrolled at SCC.

Phyllis and the late Duane Acklie, Kruse's grandparents and founders of Acklie Charitable Foundation, both started their educations through the Nebraska community college system. Duane, who went on to obtain a law degree and establish Crete Carrier Corporation, believed in the value of higher education. Duane and Phyllis also felt strongly that Nebraska's community colleges play an important role in helping students acquire a good education.

"For all of these reasons, Acklie Charitable Foundation is proud to partner with Southeast Community College to offer a second year of funding through the Learn to Dream Scholarship program," Kruse said.
