# Types of scholarships available for donations:

- Annual Fund: Donation made on annual basis by a person or organization. That donation is used each year to provide scholarships to students who meet the established eligibility criteria.
- Endowed Fund: Requires a minimum contribution of \$5000 and can be added to at any time. The principal remains in place in perpetuity, and only the interest earned each year is used to fund student scholarships. Our current interest rate being credited to endowed accounts is 4.0 percent. This rate is reviewed and set every six months by the SCC Educational Foundation Board.

"I didn't know much about SCC prior to being hired. I knew I wanted to teach full time, so I was thrilled when I was offered a full-time position (starting in the fall semester 2001). After I began working at SCC, I learned that we are rated as one of the top community colleges in the nation. I learned that we're among the best because we work each and every day to offer a superior education to our students. And I learned that I was working with many great colleagues.

Carolee Ritter, then SCC English chair, conducted my second interview. Later, after I began working as a program chair in Arts & Sciences, she was appointed as the dean of the division. I feel blessed that I was able to work with Carolee during the last 16 years of my career.

(A memorable moment for me was) during the second or third week of my employment at SCC, nine-11 occurred. I was walking into the Student Center and looked over at the television just as the plane rounded on the second tower and flew into it. I knew then that we were being attacked, but I had no idea, nor did any of us initially, what country was attacking us. I still had two classes to teach later that day, and I wondered how I should approach my students. I decided to begin with a short statement in which I reminded my students that the United States is a large, strong country which was born after winning a revolt against Britain (then a world power) and which has prevailed over any and all challenges during our 200-plus years, just as we will find a way to prevail over the forces behind this attack. I asked them to go forward from this day with confidence in themselves and in their country. I said that our fellow citizens who had died in the attacks would want us to use this day to move forward. Then I answered a few guestions, and we engaged in the lesson that was planned for the day. At the end of the class, I stood at the door and shook each student's hand and said, 'Stay steady: stay strong.'

Many of my former students live and work in the Beatrice area, so I see them in local stores, at local events, and at their places of work. It's always a thrill when one of them reminds me of a memorable moment during our work together as teacher and student.

What plans do I have for retirement? Pursue happiness by reading, giving and encouraging."

#### 2017 Beatrice/Fairbury Distinguished Alumnus

Keith L. Muller has enjoyed a lengthy career in education, having served private and public school districts in Nebraska.



But now the 59-year-old graduate of SCC's Fairbury Campus (1978) is retiring as assistant principal, certified athletic administrator, technology coordinator, and district assessment coordinator for Wilber-Clatonia Public Schools.

After Muller graduated from SCC, he transferred to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business education in 1980. He went on to earn a Master of Science degree in educational administration from UNL in 1999.

After earning his bachelor's degree, Muller began his education career in January 1981 at St. Patrick Junior/Senior High School in North Platte. He served the school as

#### In Their Own Words

"After graduating from Daykin High School in 1950, my hope was to join the United States Air Force, but my father needed me to help with the farming. However, I was drafted into the Army in 1953 and spent 17 months in Korea. The Army became a turning point in my life, and I realized that it was going to be difficult if not impossible to survive without a higher education.

I enrolled at Fairbury Junior College in fall 1955, studying pre-engineering, and graduated in 1957. There were three instructors who changed my life: Freddie Drexler, Frank Phelps and Deloris Henney. Their patience and guidance are still with me today. After my graduation I attended Kansas State University for one year, and then I married Maxine Swett (Class of 1958) on June 1, 1958!!

During the next few years I worked for the city of Fairbury and the Rock Island Railroad in the engineering department. In 1964 I was hired by the Fairbury State Bank as a teller, and not long after I was moved to the position of executive vice president until the bank was sold in 1995. That same year I went to work for Union Bank in Fairbury and was instrumental in acquiring land and helped with the building of a new bank. I retired from Union Bank in 2004. business instructor, assistant to the athletic director and coach until May 1985.

In August 1985, the Fairbury High School graduate (1976) was hired at Wilber-Clatonia as a business instructor and coach.

Throughout his career, Muller has earned numerous awards and recognitions. He is one of eight finalists for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Athletic Director of the Year to be presented on June 21 at the organization's national convention. He also received a 35-year service award from the Nebraska Coaches Association as athletic director, assistant athletic director and coach. (See the April 2017 newsletter for a partial list.)

Muller was a member of the NSIAAA for 31 years. He served as vice president, president-elect, state president, and past president from 2011-2015. He served as the District I Representative for five years.

Other involvement includes being a panel member of the Nebraska School Activities Association/NSIAAA Back to the Blocks Summits in 2013 and 2014 and as a sitting member of the Representative Assembly for District I.

During these years we had three children who all graduated from Fairbury High School. I encouraged them to attend SCC for two years and get a good solid start in college. They

all attended SCC and moved on to get graduate degrees at several universities (this includes one with a doctorate in journalism). They are all very successful in their jobs.

After retirement I felt the need to become involved in the affairs of the city of Fairbury. I am in my third four-year term as mayor of Fairbury. My hobby is working in the woodworking shop that I had built, and I have enjoyed making furniture. Currently I'm into making bowls. All five in our family graduated from FJC/SCC, and it was a good foundation for all of us."

Homer L. Ward, Pre-Engineering, 1957 has served on numerous sub-committees for Nebraska Czechs of Wilber, has emceed the National Czech/Slovak Queen Pageant, has served as parade announcer for Czech Days, and has assisted with the Duck & Dumpling Fun Run.

Muller has served on the St. Wenceslaus Catholic Church Council and has taught Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) and God Parent Catechist programs at St. Wenceslaus.

He enjoys woodworking, hunting, traveling, working on the family pasture, spending time with family and grandchildren, watching sports, and participating in badminton at the Cornhusker State Games.

Some of Keith's favorite memories occurred in the SCC theatre program. Terri Harris was the director, and students performed a play in the bottom of the dormitory. According to Keith, he struggled with his lines during rehearsal, but was able to recite them with no issues during the performances. He also remembers being part of a tour group that visited many area high schools, performing routines and promoting SCC. That, he says, was a great time.

Cuddeford and Stoltenberg are talented artists, and often their discussions would center on art and Courtney's dream of using her welding skills to create art. When Stoltenberg learned that metal designs were being accepted for the public heart art project celebrating Nebraska's sesquicentennial, she reached out to Cuddeford and encouraged her to submit a design. The selection committee approved designs submitted by both Cuddeford and Stoltenberg. This is Stoltenberg's fourth public art project. Cuddeford was instrumental in building the apple sculpture created for the SCC Lincoln Campus, but this is her first public art project. "I'm

proud of Courtney's accomplishments and for following her artistic dreams," Stoltenberg said.

Stoltenberg, an avid nature enthusiast, viewed her sculpture as another

opportunity to share the natural beauty that Nebraska soils so easily support. "Flowers are nature's jewelry, and that is why I titled this piece 'Jewel of the Heartland', a geometric stylized floral design which is displayed at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln

East Campus at Perin Porch." she said.

The inspiration for Cuddeford's design, Corn Crown, was from one of the most iconic elements in Nebraska (besides Husker football), corn. The sculpture is displayed outside the Nebraska Student Union on UNL's City Campus.

Effective January 1, 2018, Nebraska dental assistants will have the opportunity to apply for licensure in the state of Nebraska. The legislative bill was written by both the Nebraska Dental Association and Nebraska Dental Assistants Association to develop a Scope of Practice for Dental Assistants and Expanded Functions or duties for both Dental Assistants and Hygienists in Nebraska. This bill was passed within the unicameral on March 23, 2017, and Gov. Pete Ricketts signed the bill into law on March 29, 2017. Currently, the Board of Dentistry is working on the rules and regulations process for all of the expanded functions. Once this process is complete, SCC will work on implementation of the changes in the Dental Assisting program. "DANB-CDA Exam Prep courses and Expanded Function Permit courses are being

What does this mean for SCC's Dental Assisting program? Program graduates will be eligible to take the Dental Assisting National Board (CDA Exam), and the Nebraska Ethics and Jurisprudence Dental Exam. Successful completion of the classes will be required before applying for a License to Practice Dental Assisting in Nebraska. After licensure as an LDA, successful completion of additional education, and testing approved by the Board of Dentistry, dental assistants can apply for a permit for the following duties:

- Fixed Prosthodontics—crown and bridge final impressions
- Removal Prosthodontics—denture and partial final impressions and minor adjustments
- Administer and Monitor Nitrous Oxide—inhalation analgesic
- Pediatric Fixed Prosthodontics crowns on baby teeth

After 1,500 hours experience as a Licensed Dental Assistant, and upon successful completion of the required education and testing approved by the Board of Dentistry, a permit can be applied for with the following duties:

- Restorative 1—place and finish simple restorations
- Restorative 2—place and finish more complex restorations

# Ways to invest

### **Cash Gift or Pledge**

The most popular way to give is an immediate cash gift or a pledge paid over time.

### **Endowments**

A perpetual resource because the principle remains intact, and investment income is used to provide financial awards to students. A new endowment in your name or someone else's requires a minimum gift of \$5,000.

### Bequests by Will or Living Trust Distribution

Donors may specify a gift of cash, stocks, bonds, real estate, or personal property or give a percentage of their estate or the residual of the estate after gift bequests to family members.

### Retirement Savings or Insurance Beneficiary

To name the Foundation as one of the beneficiaries of retirement funds, the donor should make arrangements through the retirement fund's administrator. Other ways to give include naming the Foundation a beneficiary of an insurance policy, assigning annual dividends, or donating a paid-up policy.

### **Real Estate**

Gifts of real estate, whether private, commercial or agricultural, may be given to the Foundation.

### Stocks, Bonds, Securities

Appreciated assets held for more than one year may be transferred to the Foundation and deducted at fair market value, up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income, without incurring a capital gains tax.

### **Equipment and Other Property**

The Foundation can accept equipment or other personal property that may be used by the College or may be easily converted to a liquid asset.

### **Matching Gifts**

Some employers match charitable donations given by their employees to qualified nonprofit organizations like the Foundation.

### **Charitable Gift Annuities**

A donor can transfer gifts of cash, real estate, or appreciated securities worth \$10,000 or more to the Foundation to fund an annuity agreement leading to lifetime income.

### **Charitable Remainder Unitrusts**

With a gift of \$50,000 or more, donors can establish a trust, ensure a lifetime income for themselves, and support SCC! As the value of the trust increases, so does the donor income.

### **Charitable Lead Trusts**

The Charitable Lead Trust allows a donor to establish a trust for a specific length of time, assign interest income to the Foundation, and later reclaim the asset for the donor or the beneficiary.

### **Commodities Gift Program**

This is for producers who wish to gift a quantity of produce such as corn, beans, wheat, etc. to the Foundation.

It was approximately a 10-month process from applying for a position to being fully qualified as a Non-Licensed Operator. The NLO training included a few months of classroom training and also training on watch with an assigned crew while completing a qual (qualification) card for each watch position (turbine building,

reactor building and radwaste). After completing the qual card for each building, I completed an oral board before being qualified.

"I was a fully gualified NLO for about 18 months before applying and eventually being accepted into License class starting in July 2015. License class has been a fairly long process. We started with Nuclear Regulatory Commission general fundamentals, which is all of the base science for plant operations. After passing that test we moved into systems training, which was about a 12-week process with weekly tests, followed by a final comprehensive test and more oral boards. My class was then split up. Some went on watch to complete another qual card and others spent time in the simulator practicing abnormal operating procedures,

The students represent Energy Generation Operations, Electronic Systems Technology and Electrical & Electromechanical Technology programs at SCC. To be eligible for the scholarship, students must be enrolled in one of the three programs and maintain a minimum 3.0 grade-point average.

Koch Fertilizer employs around 90 people at its Beatrice plant. Plant manager Phillip Joyner said it's important for the company to maintain a good relationship with SCC. "Getting good, qualified people to do this kind of work is critical for us," Joyner said.

emergency operating procedures and reactivity manipulations. Additionally, we went through multiple evaluated scenarios in the simulator throughout different stages in the training program.

"For my final NRC exam last March, the test included a written 75-question test for Reactor Operators and 100 questions for Senior Reactor Operators. We also were graded on multiple simulator scenarios as three-man crews and individually performing Job Performance Measures, which are individual tasks we have to either perform or simulate.

"The progression path through the department has been really good. Management here encourages it."

"Working for NPPD is great," said Block. "The moment I started at Cooper, I knew I had the ability to develop my career."
