Medical Assisting	Medical assistants are trained to specifically work in doctor's offices. Students learn how to perform the following administrative and clinical procedures: <ul style="list-style-type: none">- appointment scheduling, patient check-in, and telehealth- collecting co-pays, record patient transactions, and making bank deposits- medical insurance and coding- patient billing procedures- obtain and record patient vital signs and body measurements- perform venipuncture and capillary puncture- test blood, urine, and other bodily fluids- swab noses and throats- administer injections- perform vision and hearing screenings- perform ear irrigations- assist with minor surgeries	\$18.45 per hour, \$38,376 annually	Certified Medical Assistant in physician offices, outpatient clinics, and other healthcare facilities.
