As a paramedic, you primarily provide emergent and non-emergent care to patients in and out of hospital settings. A successful paramedic is a detailed-oriented, team player with strong communication and decision-making skills. Your top priority is to remain calm and focused while you care for your patient during crisis situations.

Paramedic	Students learn the foundations, role, ethics, and responsibilities of EMS, patient assessment, and the recognition and treatment of medical disease in all body systems. Students will also learn to implement EMS treatment modalities with pharmaceuticals, ECG interpretation, and airway management. Trauma assessment, injury recognition, and patient management are also taught. Students will also learn rescue operations, including extrication techniques, incident command, and hazardous materials.	\$22 per hour; \$47,760 annually. SCC's Paramedic program takes its place in the industry very seriously by educating personnel for this fast-paced, ever-changing world of paramedicine.

Paramedics are often the lead member of a rescue team, with the most training and the most decision-making power. This means that the requirements to be a paramedic include strong leadership skills and the ability to perform complex life-saving functions in extremely stressful crisis situations.

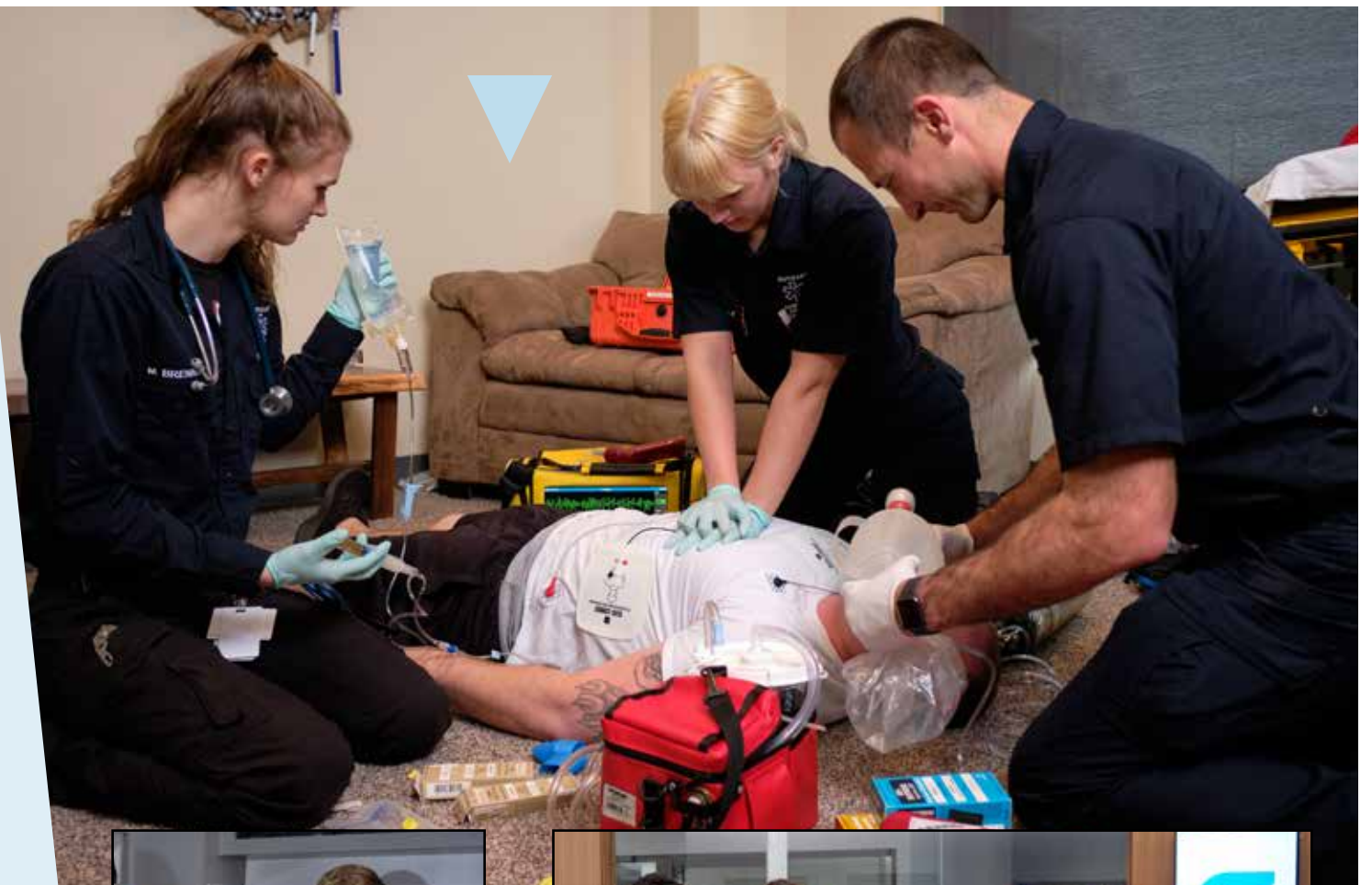
