DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE TESTING

Pursuant to the Drug-Free Workplace Act and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act, Southeast Community College will require drug and alcohol tests for employees and students in circumstances where reasonable suspicion exists.

EMPLOYEES

The College's Human Resources Office has administrative responsibility for implementing and monitoring the drug and alcohol testing procedures for employees. STUDENTS

DISCIPLINARY SANCTIONS

Student and employees who violate the established policies will be subject to disciplinary procedures consistent with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, College policy, and collective bargaining agreements. See the SCC Student Code of Conduct (www.southeast.edu/philosophyofstudentconduct) for further information regarding the conduct process. Actions that may be taken include but are not limited to one or a combination of the following disciplinary sanctions:

- Re-assignment and/or re-direction of student/classroom activities
- Dismissal from class session and/or course
- Verbal/Written Warning
- Participation in SCC alcohol and/or drug educational programs
- · Disciplinary probation
- Suspension/expulsion/eviction from on-campus facilities/programs
- Referral to an appropriate drug/alcohol treatment program
- Referral to law enforcement agencies
- Any other action deemed necessary by college officials

NOTE: SCC employees and students subject to the College's Criminal Background Check requirements are expected to self-disclose any drug/alcohol related convictions on an annual basis.



SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Substance use/abuse is unwise medically, can hurt you economically, can endanger your safety & the safety of others, can lead to chemical dependency and is illegal for many substances.

SCC encourages employees & students to seek help with substance/use problems or concerns. Amnesty may be available for students who bring their own use, addiction, or dependency to the attention of College officials independent of the threat of drug tests or conduct sanctions and who seek assistance.

IT'S THE LAW

Nebraska Laws prohibit the possession and use of controlled substances, illegal drugs, and alcoholic beverages on public property. Any changes to state law regarding marijuana or other controlled substances does not negate applicable federal statutes.

Students and employees are reminded that unlawful possession, distribution, or use of illicit drugs or alcohol may subject individuals to criminal prosecution. The College will refer violations of proscribed conduct to appropriate authorities for prosecution. Federal regulations and state laws provide penalties of fines and imprisonment for violations of the criminal statutes which include possessing, offering for sale, possessing with the intent to offer for sale, distributing or manufacturing controlled substances such as opiates, narcotics, depressants, stimulants, or hallucinogenic drugs. SCC'S DRUG & ALCOHOL POLICY

In satisfaction of this mandate and in order to fulfill its obligations under the Drug Free Workplace Act and the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act, the College absolutely prohibits employees and students of the College from unlawfully manufacturing, distributing, dispensing, possessing, using, or being under the influence of a controlled substance, including illegal drugs and alcohol, on College premises, in College-owned property, at any College sponsored or sanctioned activities (both on and off-campus) where alcohol is not permitted/is prohibited, and in all places where its employees and students work and learn. This campus prohibition includes campus student housing and applies to any person on College grounds, whether they are a member of the College community or not.

NOTE: SCC quests and visitors suspected of being under the influence of a controlled substance may be asked to leave College property or any officially recognized activity. Failure to comply may result in law enforcement intervention.

Tobacco	Lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis; heart disease; leukemia; cataracts; oral cancer
